Dec. 3, 2013 6 p.m.

Present were: President Rosalind Philips, Vice President Colleen Easley, Secretary Chris Weinreich, Treasurer John Damitio, newsletter editor Teri Dean, Tom Blankenship, who heads the Critique Group, Frank and Terri Townsend, Wes Kirkpatrick and Randy Yaple.

November Minutes: Chris made a motion to approve the minutes, Wes seconded and the motion was passed.

Treasurer's report for October:

Beginning Balance:	\$1291.56
withdrawal:	\$ 450.00
End Balance	\$ 942.56
Savings	\$1379.13

Club treasurer John Damitio, in an e-mail to the board members, raised these issues about dues:

- 1) what to do regarding members [sic] that are not recorded to have paid 2013 dues,
- 2) whether 2013 new members have their 2014 dues due in December 2013 or sometime on or before their anniversary date and;
- 3) two members made a payment late in 2013, did not pay 2012, and were members previous to that? Are those two considered new members again or just late in paying 2013 and pay full amount for 2014?

These questions were brought to the table and a discussion followed.

Concerning question #1: Colleen moved that those members who have not paid their 2013 dues be taken off the mailing list but kept on the Yahoo list, which is open to the general public. Frank seconded the motion and it was passed.

Concerning question #2: In a motion to keep things simple, Teri moved that the dues be pro-rated on a quarterly basis: Those paying in the first quarter (January thru March) pay full dues (\$20); those paying in the second quarter (April thru June) pay \$15; those paying in the third quarter (July thru Sept.) pay \$10 and; those paying in the fourth quarter (Oct. thru Dec.) pay \$5. Wes seconded the

motion and it was passed.

Concerning question #3: The members pay full amount for 2014.

President's report: Club web site -- Rosalind met with Dave Simmerman, the web master for the club's web site, about several web site concerns, mainly with making the web site operation easily and smoother to use. Rosalind said it was a very productive meeting and Dave will be making changes to the site.

Calendar: The club's holiday party is Tuesday, Dec. 17. It will be at the Edge Lake Mobile Home Park, Community Center, 3938 21st Ave. SE, Lacey. The meeting to compile the club's Annual will be Jan. 18. Where the meeting will be held is yet to be decided.

General meeting: Club's holiday party. Frank moved to expend \$50 from the club treasury to defray the costs of the pot luck, Wes seconded and the motion was passed.

Digital Group: no report

Critique Group: no meeting this month due to a date conflict with club holiday party.

NWCCC (Northwest Council of Camera Clubs): That organization has asked the Olympia Camera Club to handle the registration at the organizations meeting in Gig Harbor in April. There was a short discussion and Rosalind asked for more clarification - - what was entailed in doing the registration, do we handle the money, etc. No action was taken.

Old Business: Photos at the Thurston County Fair -- This subject was brought back for discussion after being tabled at the November meeting. A issue was a written complaint from a club member about a picture that they found objectionable. Frank is the superintendent for the photo exhibit at the fair had gone to the fair board and asked them to do a walk thru after the pictures were up to determined if there was anything objectionable. The fair board did not want to take on that role. So Frank then wrote a proposed rule that states: "As this is an exhibit for all age groups, consideration should be givens to the content of the image; the Superintendent reserves the right to disqualify and withhold from display any photograph he/she deems inappropriate for a family fair."

Frank explained that his policy will be to, "disallow any photo with full frontal nudity, where the body parts that should be private are exposed. Where such parts are kept private (shadowing, crossed arms, etc.) I will not find objectionable. Images that do not contain nudity but may be considered edgy will have to be considered on an as-needed basis with input from our own members who are present at the time."

New Business: none

Hiding your Pins


You can hide the Adjustment Brush, Radial Filter, and Graduated Filter pins anytime by pressing the letter H on your keyboard. Bring them back by pressing H again.

Shortcut for Adding New Edits

To add a new adjustment pin quickly, just press the return (enter) key.

BUTTERFLIES ARE NOT FREE

I have only lived in the Pacific Northwest for a little over 30 years, so I am not yet accustomed to the cold, wet weather of the winter months. Though I will probably be leading an expedition to Mt Rainier at some time during the season I am happy to find as many indoor activities as I can. One that I've never done but have long wanted to accomplish is a visit to the Pacific Science Center in Seattle. My main goal is the tropical butterfly exhibit, but there is also an exhibit of The Photographs of Modern Cuisine, as well as rubber dinosaurs, giant robotic insects, and a tide pool. Plus, if it is not raining we can visit the sonic bloom and the grounds of the Seattle Center. If the weather cooperates we will drive up the hill to Kerry Park for the iconic view of the Seattle skyline.

Pacific Science Center's Tropical Butterfly House opened Dec. 26, 1998. Their goal in creating this 4,000 square foot exhibit was to build an immersive exhibit that would provide a glimpse into a part of the world very unlike Seattle — a warm, sunny place where colorful butterflies are active 365 days a year. Seattle skies do not provide the light necessary for tropical species to thrive. Supplemental heat, light, and humidity are provided to sustain a tropical ecosystem among the cool, grey, drizzly days of the Pacific Northwest. The Center imports about 500 tropical butterflies weekly, from South and Central America, Africa, and Asia.

The Center introduces the world premier of The Photography of Modernist Cuisine: The Exhibition, a showcase of the stunning imagery produced by Nathan Myhrvold and his team at The Cooking Lab. This exhibition is in many ways the culmination of Myhrvold's lifelong interests in food, science and photography. It offers guests a unique perspective on food in which the aesthetic beauty of plants, animals and cooking phenomena illuminates the fascinating, accessible science at work in our kitchens

every day.

Perched on stems taller than a three-story building, this innovative art work of the sonic bloom features glowing blossoms that spread 20 feet from petal-to-petal and sport photovoltaic cells amongst their stamens.

Travel back in time to the Mesozoic Era, where you'll meet seven moving, roaring, robotic dinosaurs in a lifelike environment. You can also stand in the footprint of a giant duckbill dinosaur, take the controls of the Pneumoferosaurus -- "Air and Iron Lizard" -- to see how animatronic dinosaurs work, and explore the Mesozoic world with interactive exhibits, real fossils, dioramas and more.

Kerry Park is a small park on the south slope of Queen Ann Hill in Seattle, overlooking the City. The view is probably the most photographed site in Seattle and if the weather cooperates we'll bring back some "wall hangers".

All of this will take place on Saturday, January 25. We will depart from the Martin Way Park and Ride, just off I-5 near Regal Cinemas at 9:00 AM. We will definitely car pool to cut down on driving and parking expenses. As mentioned in the headlines, butterflies are not free, admission to the Pacific Science Center is \$18 for adults \$16 if you are 65 and older. If 10 or more people promise to attend we can arrange for a group discount, but I'll need a pretty firm commitment before I peruse that avenue. Bring tripods, though I imagine they will be useless in the Center but a must at Kerry Park and helpful if we travel the Seattle Center grounds.

Announcing the Year 2013 OCC *Annual!*

Every year, OCC members get together to assemble a permanent collection of their recent photographic work. We do this by publishing our *Annual*, a booklet to which we all contribute our photographs. There is a copy of the *Annual* published for each contributor so each person gets a copy to keep. We have found these books to be excellent keepsakes and inspirations. We assemble the book at a gathering at Terry and Bonnie Liberty's home, accompanied by a "finger food" lunch. We would encourage you to get involved in this enjoyable activity. It provides a good deal of fun, a collection of your colleagues' work and a look at where we all were, photographically in 2013. The details are as follows:

The Annual

Each *Annual* is made up of one image from each participating OCC member or former member. Participation is voluntary, of course. It's nice but not required that the images were created during 2013. Images may be created by any photo process, film and/or digital, and may be any size from a snapshot to a maximum of 8 1/2 x 11 inches. Each participant provides one print per book so if there were 20 participants, there would be 20 books, each with one print from each participant. Binding costs will be \$4.00 per book. This is up again from last year.

Deadline

Members who wish to participate must declare their interest via e-mail directly to me at (libertyt@sprynet.com) or verbally at the OCC holiday party on December 17th. The end of the holiday party will be the deadline for declaring and we will announce the final count at the end of the party. We will also publish this number to all declared participants.

Publishing Party

The publishing party will be on Saturday, January 18th at Noon at Terry and Bonnie's home, 8741 Stoney Creek Lane SW. This is party time! providing us with a "finger food" lunch and an excellent opportunity to become acquainted with other members. In the event you are unable to attend, you may deliver your prints to the Liberty's or send them with another member. Please provide the name of the person who will be present to assemble your *Annual* for you.

Note: Because we permanently assemble the Annual, all books must contain their complete contents at the party. It is difficult to add or exchange images with those already included in the binder, so a fully completed Annual, ready for binding is our goal! Please assure that your prints are at the Liberty's, ready for assembly on or before the party date.

The Prints

Note 1: Regardless of printing method or binding method, please assure your prints are dry and free of any adhesive residue or substances that would harm other prints in the book.

Note 2: Please endeavor to get your prints completed well before the party. In years past, last-minute print orders from Costco and others have gone awry preventing some folks' images from being included in the book so allow for possible delays and errors in your prints.

Note 3: Most folks like to place the title and the name of the maker of the images somewhere on the mounting (Option 1) or in the print itself (Option 2).

Option 1: Prints Mounted on Paper Pages


Photos can be mounted on 8 1/2 x 11 pages with titles, etc. The preferred paper is 24 pound bond or similar. Please create your own pages and mount your prints, ready to bind before the party. You may use materials, colors etc. of your choice. In that way you can control the placement of the print and information you want

included on your page. When mounting, allow a 1/2 to 3/4 inch extra margin ("gutter") along the left hand (long) edge of the page for binding. **Archival mounting materials are preferred.**

Option 2: Prints Done Directly on 8 1/2 x 11 Photo Paper

You can bring prints that are done directly on 8 1/2 x 11 photo paper. We will bind these into the books with no need for other materials. When printing, allow a 1/2 to 3/4 inch extra margin ("gutter") along the left hand (long) edge of the page for binding.

Directions Via Highway 101 and Mud Bay Road

Here are directions to Terry and Bonnie's house.

Go South on I5 to Olympia the exit on highway 101.

Take the exit and head West on 101.

You'll pass exits to Cooper Point Rd. and Black Lake Blvd.

Keep going West on 101.

Get off 101 on the Mud Bay Rd. exit.

Bear right until you come to a stop sign the bottom of the exit at the fire station on Mud Bay Rd.

Turn left on Mud Bay Rd. and cross under the freeway.

Shortly after the underpass is Delphi Rd.

Turn left on Delphi.

Follow Delphi for about six miles.

Eventually (about 6 miles) you will come to the intersection with Waddell Creek Rd on your right.

At the intersection, stay on Delphi (left) for another 1/4 mile or so.


