



- 4. Again, please mute yourself if you are not talking.


### **Getting Started with Zoom**

- 1. Click on the link or paste the link in your browser. This is the best way to join the meeting.
- 2. The Zoom application will automatically download and install the first time you join the meeting.
- 3. You can download the Zoom application ahead of time if you like at <a href="https://zoom.us/download">https://zoom.us/download</a>.
- 4. If you already have the Zoom application, please make sure it is up to date by updating your application regularly. Zoom continues to improve security and introduce new features.
- 5. You will see after clicking on the link:




a. Choose "Open Zoom Meetings"

b. You will then join the meeting and will see



Click "Join with Computer Audio"


6. You will need to turn on your camera if you do not see yourself. Look in the lower left for this icon. You will just see the full bar if you are using a Mac:



Click on the "Start Video" icon. You should now see yourself.

7. To Mute/Unmute click on the "Mute" icon. Please keep yourself muted unless you are talking.

8. To see a list of participants or to enter the chat click on the "More" icon. You will not see a "More" button on the Mac or if you are full screen.

### **Teleconverter and Extension Tubes**

Teleconverter (TC) and extension tubes are two different devices that you can use to modify the behavior of your lens. Teleconverters are also called tele-extenders, extenders, and multipliers.

A teleconverter is an additional lens that you put between the telephoto lens and the camera. It essentially magnifies whatever is in the center area of the lens. They usually come as 1.4X and 2.0X magnification strengths. This means that a 400 mm lens used with a 1.4X has an effective reach of 540 mm. A TC is a great way to extend the reach of your lens without buying big and expensive lenses.

There are a couple of disadvantages to using a TC. A 1.4X loses 1-stop of light, a 2.0 loses 2-stops. Suppose you have a 400 mm lens with a maximum aperture of f/5.6. The addition of a 1.4X TC means the lens now has a maximum aperture of f/8. This is a much slower lens. The next issue is focus speed. Your lens will take noticeably longer to focus if your TC is more than 1.4X. Another issue is image quality. Sometimes the images are a little soft. There also tends to be less contrast in the images. One TC does not fit all lenses. For example, Canon's 1.4X III does not fit my Canon 100-400 mm. It does fit my 70-200 mm. Generally, you will get better results if you use the TC made by the manufacturer of the lens. Be careful. Make sure that you check that the teleconverter will work with the lens you plan to use it with. You can stack TCs, just be aware that you will be losing a lot of light.

This Snowy Owl was taken with my Canon 1D Mark II using a 1.4X teleconverter with a Canon 100-400 mm f/4.5-5.6.



An extension tube is a hollow tube that goes between the lens and camera. It reduces the minimum focus distance (MFD) between the subject and lens and increases the magnification. This is useful for getting closer to your subject and magnifying it so it fills the frame. The extension tube contains no optics so there is almost no effect on image sharpness and contrast. It is a great low cost way to turn any lens into a macro lens. Wide angle lenses

tend to work better than telephoto lenses. This is because the MFD is measured from the sensor and not the front of the lens. The result is that it is possible for a super telephoto lens to have a MFD inside the lens. I use a 12 mm extender with a super telephoto so that I can focus closer. An example is taking pictures of ducks while using a blind. Often the ducks will come closer than the MFD of the lens. An extension tube allows me to get pictures of the closer ducks. Prime lenses tend to have sharper results than zoom lenses. Just remember, that the quality of the glass has a bigger influence over sharpness than prime or zoom.

Extension tubes come in different widths and are measured in millimeters. The thicker the tube the smaller the MFD and the greater the magnification. Extension tubes generally come in sets and you can stack them to achieve even smaller MFD and greater magnification. It is possible to get extension tubes with electronics so that the camera can communicate the aperture to the lens. This is highly recommended as the work around for a manual extension tube does not sound like it is good for the equipment. The article referenced at the end explains the technique.

Of course, there are cons to using extension tubes. Light is lost just like with a TC. The amount of light lost depends on the width of the extension tube(s) used. Adding extension tube(s) moves the lens farther away from the sensor. This effectively reduces the aperture making the image darker. Another con is that there is often vignetting at or near the maximum aperture. The amount of vignetting is dependent on the lens. Another factor in vignetting is the width of the extension tube(s). A 12 mm tube contributes little vignetting; an 18 mm or larger contributes more.

This image of a Chocolate Lily was taken with my Canon 7D Mark II with a 12 mm extension tube on an 18-35 mm f/3.5 lens.



Teleconverters and extension tubes are great ways to save cost. Try before you buy. Rent them from LensRental.com or BorrowLenses.com. I have rented

### When and Why to use a Polarizer

While out photographing in the wet lush forest around Lake Quinault I was reminded how important using a polarizer is in photography. Without getting into any technical jargon, what a polarizing filter does is it cuts down on certain types of light. It will reduce glare and reflections and help make a blue sky pop. In the old days of SLR cameras we used a linear polarizer but with today's DSLR autofocus and auto-exposure cameras the polarizer you want is a circular polarizer.

The polarizer screws onto the front of your lens and the front part of the filter has a ring that spins. When spinning this front ring it is best to always turn it to the left. Turning the ring repeatedly to the right (same direction you would turn the whole filter



when removing it from the lens) could slowly loosen the filter from the lens and cause it to fall off; resulting in a broken or lost filter.

Polarizer's work best when used at a 90 degree angle to the sun. While looking through your viewfinder or at your live view screen turn the polarizer and watch for the change as polarization takes place. For example the sky turns a deeper blue and the clouds seem to pop against the blue sky. Be aware that you don't always want maximum polarization as the sky can become too

dark and seem unnatural. Turn the polarization ring until you find a pleasing amount of polarization.

In this image no polarizer was used.



This image is the same scene but with a polarizer used. Notice the difference in the sky and clouds.

Be aware that using a polarizer on a wide angle lens may result in the sky becoming



darker on one side of the composition and lighter on the other side. Be careful in the amount of polarization you apply and you shouldn't have a problem.

Another use of a polarizer is to remove reflections off the surface of water so you can see deeper into the water. They are also good in winter scenes as they neutralize the reflections coming off the snow giving the scene more depth.

No polarizer was used for this image.



The same scene but with a polarizer. Notice the difference in the rocks and water.



A third use for a polarizing filter is when photographing

along a stream with wet rocks (images above also illustrate this) or in the forest or other setting where there are wet leaves. Polarizing the scene will decrease the reflection of light bouncing off the rocks or vegetation and add contrast and saturation.

No polarizer was used for this image.

This image was taken in the same place as the prior image but a polarizer was used. Notice the difference in the vegetation.



There are some disadvantages to using a polarizer:

Polarizing filters reduce the amount of light entering your lens by 1-3 stops depending on the filter.

When used on a wide angle lens they can cause uneven sky color.

Another thing to think about is how many polarizers' do you need if you have different size lens filter threads. For example, my Canon 24-105 lens is 77mm while my Tamron 28-75 lens is 67mm. Instead of buying a polarizer to fit each lens, I purchased a step up ring 77/67. This ring fits on the 67mm lens and then I can attach the 77mm polarizer onto the ring. You can find the lens filter size by looking at the inside of the lens cap.

### When you're gone, where will your photos go?

Some of you may have met my sister-in-law Kathy Brooks at Olympia Camera Club events. Kathy was a creative and enthusiastic person, and very instrumental in encouraging my interest in photography. In early September Kathy died of a stroke, very suddenly and unexpectedly; she was only 69 years old.

Kathy was always very disciplined about photo backups: duplicate external hard drives, replaced with new drives every year, and old drives kept in separate fire safe locations. Now that she is gone, neither of her grown children know how to access or use her photo storage programs, further complicated by the fact that she used a Mac and they use PCs. I am in no way being critical of her backup system, or anything you have in place. As long as it makes sense to you, that is great. But what is going to happen to these files when you are gone?

I have two main points to make, and most likely some of you have advice and experience you can share as well.

- 1. As much as your friends and family love you and support your hobby, they are probably not going to be interested in about 99% of your electronically-stored photos. Nonetheless, you may want to be sure someone knows how to log onto your storage system and access photos they might be interested in. Consider creating electronic albums for individuals and update them regularly, at least once a year. Perhaps send the jpeg files to them to store on their own computer, or give them online access to files that won't disappear when you are no longer paying a cloud storage fee. If you store all your files locally, be sure someone knows where they are kept, how to access them, and how your files are organized. If you store everything in the cloud, you'll need to check with your provider to see what happens to access after your death. I'm considering (OK, OK I haven't actually done this yet) pulling out my favorite dozen photos every year and putting jpeg versions on Google drive, with our daughter having shared access.
- 2. Share the joy of your photos TODAY! Print them out and give to people you think will enjoy them. This could be in a frame (physical or electronic), an album or book, calendar, coffee mug, etc. etc. Photo printing services like Costco, Vista, Bay Photo, Shutterfly and others have all kinds of

items you can have your photos printed on. The OCC program on November 10th will feature members sharing ideas on how they share their photos as gifts.

Bottom line: keep on enjoying this wonderful hobby, share with others today, and, if you think someone might want access to your files after your death or incapacity, make sure to leave detailed instructions on how they can do that.






























### Olympia Camera Club Business Meeting Draft November 3, 2020, 6:30pm to 8:30pm Zoom




