

Message from the OCC Webmaster

Hello Fellow OCC Members,

During this difficult time of social distancing, web conferencing has taken on a whole new importance to organizations like the Olympia Camera Club. Our club has decided to use the *GoToMeeting* platform to conduct virtual meetings until it's safe to return to "in-person" meetings. If you would like to participate in upcoming virtual meetings and you haven't already installed the GoToMeeting software, I suggest you either download the app to your phone or tablet, or go to https:// global.gotomeeting.com/install/177630701 to install it on your computer. For Mac computer users, you will also need to give permission for the application to use your camera. Go to System Preferences. Choose Security and Privacy. Click the Privacy Tab, and then choose Camera from the list on the left. Be sure that GoToMeeting is checked.

The club will also be depending more and more on the *DropBox* app to make sharing images more expedient during our virtual meetings. Many of our members have already joined the '*OCC Member Sharing*' DropBox folder, but some have not. Today I did a review of which members had not yet joined that DropBox folder and will be sending those members an invitation to join. If you wish to participate in our online meetings and share images, you should accept that invitation. If you don't already have DropBox on your computer, you can set up a free account by clicking the link that will be included in the invitation email.

Members who wish to share images during a meeting will need to place their images into the 'OCC Member Sharing' DropBox folder <u>prior</u> to the meeting time. Put images you wish to share into a folder labeled with your full name and then place that folder into the DropBox folder. The meeting facilitator will share your images via their screen and give each member a chance to talk about their images.

For Member Sharing Night, I've created a folder with that name for you to drop your individual folders into. (Again, be sure your images are in a folder with your name on it.) Image size isn't critical for displaying, but in the interest in conserving space in our DropBox, please limit image size to no more than 2048 on the long size. Any other meeting facilitators who decide to use the DropBox for sharing files will include instructions with their calendar reminder emails.

If you have any questions about using DropBox, please feel free to contact me. If you don't get an invitation to join the OCC Member Sharing folder, please contact me. I'll make sure you get access.

Teleconferencing with the Olympia Camera Club

The Olympia Camera Club has decided to use teleconferencing to hold our meetings during the Covid-19 pandemic. We are using GoToMeeting.

GoToMeeting (GTM) is an intuitive application to use. Here is the link to the OCC meetings: https://www.gotomeet.me/OlympiaCameraClub/occ-meeting

This link was sent to each member of the Camera Club in an email this past week. Please safeguard the link (bookmark or archive it) as it will be used for all future Club meetings and will **not** be displayed in the Calendar reminders. If you have misplaced the link, it is available in the 'Members Only' area of the website.

You can also dial in using your phone. Please safeguard this number in case you need to use it to access the meetings.



The link above is the same for all OCC meetings except for Board meetings. Board meetings have a different link. The telephone number is a nice feature. If you do not have a headset and microphone, you can call into the meeting via phone and still see the meeting on your computer. Just dial the number and enter the access code followed by the # character when prompted. I have a headset and mic, but sometimes the internet connection audio cuts in and out. When that happens, I click on the settings gear and change the audio from computer to phone.

The first time you click on the meeting link, you will be asked to install the application. It is a good idea to do that ahead of time. Click on the install link to do that. Click on this link: https://www.gotomeeting.com/meeting/ipad-iphone-android-apps if you want to use GTM on a tablet or phone. This is different from using the phone for just for audio. You'll be able to see the presentation screen and even share your screen.

After installing the application, you will see a screen that asks you to choose your preferred audio method. Pick computer if you have a headset or if your computer has built-in speakers and mic. Most laptops have built in microphones. Choose phone if your computer is not equipped with a built-in mic, you do not have a headset or your internet connection is weak. Click save and your preferences are saved. You can always click on the gear icon to change your audio method. On the screen you pick your mic and speakers. Plug your headset in and select it from the drop down options for speaker and mic. You can also test your speakers and mic on the screen. Just click on the play button to test the speakers and speak into the mic.

After set-up you arrive at the room screen.



Notice that the mic is off and the camera is on. Click the camera button if you do not wish your image to show. Click OK, I'M READY and you are in the meeting.



At the bottom of the screen are your controls.



Use these to mute your mic, turn off your camera, share your screen or leave the meeting. To share your screen, you will need to get an invite from the meeting host.

The upper right corner of the screen contains the icons for meeting attendees, chat window and audio settings. To see who's participating in the meeting click the first icon. To type in the chat window, click on the middle icon. To change your audio settings from computer audio to phone or visa-versa, click on the gear icon.



That's all there is to using GTM.



The Annual PSA Conference, now called PSA Photo Festival, will be held in Colorado Springs, Colorado from Sept 29 to October 4, 2020. There will be learning experi-



ences in all areas of photography; Photoshop, Lightroom, Drones, Time Lapse, Videography, Smart Phone Photography, Image Preservation, a Macro Workshop, Model shoot and more.

The Keynote speaker is Art Wolfe. Other well known speakers are Bob Krist, Scott Wilson, Rad Drew, Ben Wilmore and Charles Needles as well as others.

Kenmore Camera Photo Gallery Update

Because several of our members have expressed interest in participating in the Northwest Council of Camera Clubs' **PHOTO GALLERY** at the Kenmore Camera Store our board voted to notify NWCCC that we would participate. The show will be in September and October of 2020. Here are the details:

Deadline for OCC members to RSVP to participate is March 27. We notify NWCCC at their March 7 board meeting that the Olympia Camera club will participate in the gallery.

Each club is asked to submit (1) photo and have in reserve (1) other photo if needed. The gallery holds up to 22 photos, so if any club does not RSVP by April 1, some clubs may be asked to submit two photos. If more than one member submits an image to OCC we will use some method to determine 1st, 2nd, 3rd and so on.

Theme: The store owner is requesting original photos of the Pacific Northwest that are landscapes, wildlife, sports, scenic, or shapes and/or patterns found in nature. No "Altered Reality" or "Creative" images that have been created or heavily manipulated in a computer. No nudes.

Orientation: A portrait or landscape orientation is fine.

Each club or photographer is responsible for the costs of matting and framing the photo(s). Mats must be WHITE (any shade) and frames must be BLACK. No brown wood grain, gold, silver, or any other color than black frames.

Size – no smaller than 12 x18 or larger than 20x24. This measurement is the INSIDE of the frame, i.e. the outside edge of the mat. Rectangles and squares are fine.

Wired – the frame must be wired on the back. See attached photo. Images that are not framed or wired correctly will not be in the gallery.

Sales: Each photo needs the following information. Title, Maker's name, Club Name, photographer's email, phone and (optional) price. Prospective buyers will need to contact the maker directly. Kenmore Camera will not facilitate any sales.

Deadline to submit framed photos: Members who want to participate must bring their print to the May Member Sharing meeting, May 19. Images do not have to be matted or framed at this time. Images selected to go forward can then be matted and framed. Frank Townsend will insure prints are forwarded to NWCCC by July 15, 2020.

Please deliver photo labeled in the upper right corner with Title, Name of Maker, Club name, maker's email and phone number and (optional) price. Photos without this information will not be in the gallery and can't be sold.

Don't Lose It

Being a photographer means you have stuff. Cameras, lenses, filters, tripods, and those pesky lens caps. You need the lens cap for protecting the lens but if you don't have pockets what do you do with the cap while you're taking photos? You could put it in your camera bag but that means somehow getting to the bag pockets, which can be difficult if the bag is a backpack style camera bag. If you put the cap down, you risk misplacing it or just plain losing it. I was out taking photos; I didn't have pockets, and lost my lens cap. I had placed it on a rail as I took photos and then I heard it as it bounced off the rocks multiple times and it landed in the ocean. I have lens cap leashes on most of my lenses, but I had not put one on this lens yet. It only takes a second and your cap is gone. You could lose it in tall grass if you move to get a different angle, it could be stolen by a gull (they think everything is theirs), or it could go for a swim. What is a lens leash? It is an elastic band that goes around your lens with a small cord that is attached to the cap with a little sticky pad. I prefer this style because they are cheap, easy to use, and fit any lens cap. This style does have a few drawbacks. The leash can get in the way when trying to use your lens hood and the cap will swing as it hangs from the lens. The cap swinging can affect any long exposure photography. When it is really getting in my way, I take it off and use the elastic band as a wristband to keep the cap with me.



I ordered a new lens cap and a leash, but I decided to look on the internet for options. There is the obvious solution of wearing clothes with pockets or a fanny pack. I wanted to look beyond that to see what other options designers have come up with. There are lens cap holders that attach to your camera strap. One design, the Cap Buckle, comes in sizes that fit the lens cap and some are a simple clip that can hold any size lens cap. The Cap Buckle could be a bit limiting for the photographer who has many different size lens caps. You might have to own two or three and have them on your bag strap just to cover all your lens diameters. The simple clip styles holders seem okay, but I would be a bit nervous of the cap getting knocked out of the clip. I did buy one and I put it on my bag for those times I might need it.



I found another option that could work for some people. It is not a purse or a fanny pack but an instant pocket called Pocket Plus (https://thepocketplus.com/). This will allow you to clip on a pocket at your waistband for when you need it and then take it off when you don't. I am not sure if this would get in the way as you move around to get the image, but it is another solution to the problem. After much research I don't feel like I found a solution that would work for everyone all the time. But if you go to the beach and you see a lens cap lying there in the sand please pick it up and give it back to me. I have provided the last known sighting of the cap for reference.

Life in Costa Rica during the Pandemic by Nancy Nelson

27 March 2020

Dear OCC Members,

Pam suggested you might be interested in the letter I wrote to our family describing our experiences in going shopping today down here in Costa Rica. I was inspired to take phone camera photos by Cynthia's virtual presentation on her trip to Italy last fall. Thank you Cynthia.

So, we've been staying home - social isolation - since the afternoon of Friday, March 13th. We do have a family that lives here on the property, but we've all agreed to keep two meters apart, mainly because their 18-year-old daughter Yendry works six days a week at Burger King, takes two busses to get there and back, and so has lots of potential exposure.

We're well set for food and projects, but about every 5 or 6 days we head out just to keep from getting casita-fever. We have minimal physical interaction with others - we are in our car, and the stores are so empty we are often literally the only people in each aisle.

Today we started out at Pricesmart, the Latin American branch of Costco. They open an hour early for us oldsters. They're quite organized about disinfecting



the carts between uses, and ask us to use a squirt of hand sanitizer before we go in. There are marks on the floor to remind us what two meters of separation looks like, and they have set practical limits on some food items, like beans and rice. Today they had tables of store-branded bags pre-packed with basic food items, for \$31 each. I was going to buy some, but took a peek inside and decided their idea of essentials was a bit different than mine, so we bought large packs of beans and rice to give away instead. They have disconnected the Dyson Air Blade hand dryers in the bathrooms, and installed paper towel dispensers instead. They've also done away with the little plastic things you use to mark the conveyor belt between your goodies and those of the person in front of you,

Next we went to EPA, the Costa Rican equivalent of Home Depot or Lowes. Unlike a traditional hardware store, where you had to try to describe what you want to someone behind a counter, who would then go back into the depths of the store and come back to see if they had the correct size screw or nail or whatever, this one lets you use carts, wander up and down the aisle and touch things. Dan thought he'd died and gone to heaven when they opened.

But the cart-cleaning system was very bizarre. Here you see the handwashing station, outside the entry door. You turn on the water, wash, and then use your clean hands to touch the same faucet you had just touched with dirty hands (just like home!). Then, you take a cart (has the



handle been cleaned?) and enter the store. Once inside, an employee offers to disinfect the cart handle for you, and directs you to a wall dispenser of disinfecting gel. I kind of think we customers were using the system in a way that wasn't intended.

The aisles were marked with suggested separation distances

Next stop: the cooperativa, to buy some nasty chemicals to try to keep the leaf-cutter ants at bay. They continue to use the traditional system of having us tell an employee what we want, they enter the info into a computer, then we go to a cash register (the caja - box) to pay, and then finally to a window to pick up what we'd paid for. They had a clever way to keep us a safe distance away from the clerks behind the counter (the white plastic fence and flower pots are not usually there)

The woman in the caja had covered up the hole in the plastic shield that allows her to better hear the customer's voice.

And like most stores, they have hand sanitizer right next to the pen you use to sign for a credit card. I use my own pen.





Last but not least was a stop at my favorite bakery. This sign says that only two customers are to be in the store at one time. People outside wait very patiently, and keep their distance from each other.

Traffic on these trips is a breeze. And there are very few people in the stores. On our way home, we passed this scene of people spac-



ing themselves apart while they wait for the bus - both on the bench and on the curb. Not sure what they do once they're on the bus...



When we get home, we carry everything into the garage. I wipe down the car steering wheel, door handles, locks, window buttons, etc. etc. with a Chlorox wipe.

Then we do the 20 second "Happy Birthday to You two times" hand wash, and I pick up the same things I just carried in from the car before I washed my hands to put them away. So I guess I'm not that different from the EPA system.

Just checked the latest number of cases of Covid-19 here: 263. We had a couple of days of 23-24% increases,

but for the last three days they have increased by only 12 -13%. So it appears that the efforts at social distancing are working to flatten the curve.

Take care of yourselves. We'd love to hear your experiences.

The Vast Silent Land: Antarctica

Antarctica was not what I expected. I'd watched documentaries on TV depicting vast silent spaces, white as far as the eye can see, or tourists in red jackets gathered around colonies of Emperor penguins.


But that's not what cruises to Antarctica are like. Sure, I

The first day on board was a busy one with endless lines and tedious tasks. A treaty amongst many nations ensures that Antarctica remains pristine. We were not allowed to wear our own boots ashore or even in the Zodiac boats that we cruised around the bays in. The latter

was in case we had to make an emergency landing on shore.

We lined up to get loaner boots which we kept throughout the trip. We had to wear them while walking through a chemi-



cal bath whenever we embarked or disembarked so that any seeds would be killed. Another long wait was for the vacuum. This was to remove any seeds from our outer clothing.

The ship navigated the dreaded Drake Passage with aplomb, the captain changing course when we ran into wind and waves that were a bit much for the passengers, and we headed farther south across the Antarctic Circle.

The goal of the cruise director was to give all 470 of us a chance to land, and to cruise in the zodiacs every



day. Whew! That meant a lot of trips. Only 100 people are allowed on shore at any one time.

Very annoying were the loudspeaker announcements. We were divided into 30 groups, and each

disembarkation was announced twice (120 right there); plus there were special groups such as photography, kayaking, etc.

The silent moments came only on the top deck of the ship while I gazed out at the incredible shores. But there was a day when the weather prevented any trips off the ship, and on that day there was an entirely different mood. There was no more heightened energy, bursts of activity and of course hardly any announcements. Instead, people settled into chairs and read

books, played slow games of cards, or had murmured conversations.

Was it worth it? Well, *yeah*. But best to have reasonable expectations before



going. You'll see plenty of ice and rock and penguins, and perhaps it would be, like it was for me, your 7th continent. All of that should be enough.

were backed up on the Lightroom cloud service.


