# Practical Photography December 11, 2018 7-9 pm

For the December meeting of Practical Photography, we will be learning about high-dynamic-range imaging, commonly referred to as HDR. Believe it or not, the first HDR photograph was taken over 150 years ago by photographer Gustave Le Gray. Gustave realized that he wasn't able to capture the image he was looking at with one single shot. His camera lens could not capture what his eye was seeing. One shot was not able to capture all the details from the darkest to the lightest areas of the photo. Gustave combined the use of two negatives of the same image, each taken with different exposure times. The result of his technique was that he could capture the highlights of shadows of the sky as well as the detailed shadows of the sea in the photo he had taken. He created a stunning HDR composition. Much has advanced in HDR since Gustave's techniques. Today we have software applications, camera advancements, even applications for phone systems.

On December 11<sup>th</sup> at 7:00PM, Chris Shealy will be presenting a program on HDR. Chris purchased a Canon 80D and began his journey into HDR. Chris noticed the amazing looking photographs that were "over the top" in colors and saturation. He became obsessed with taking online tutorials and editing images. He discovered a few

photographers who are considered to be some of the best in HDR photography. He strived for more realistic looking HDR images and experimented with different ways of creating HDR images. Chris is looking forward to showing his work flow and what he has learned over the last year to everyone who attends the class in December.

We have done portrait, panorama, street and now HDR photography in our Practical Photography meetings. In May we will be doing night photography. I'm always looking for someone who would like to present a class. If you would be able to do a class on long exposure or composition, stacking, use of flash, focus and exposure, or any other topic the members would be interested in, please contact me at the meetings or by email so we can set something up. 


# Ridgefield NWR Field Trip

There is a copy of the Annual published for each contributor so each person gets a copy to keep. We have found these books to be excellent keepsakes and inspirations. We will assemble the book at a gathering at the Friendly Village Community Center, accompanied by a "finger food" lunch. We would encourage you to get involved in this enjoyable activity. It provides a good deal of fun, a collection of your colleagues' work and a look at where we all were, photographically, in 2018. The details are as follows:

# The Annual

Each Annual is made up of one image from each participating OCC member in good standing. Participation is voluntary, of course. It's nice but not required that the images were created during 2018. Images may be created by any photo process, film and/or digital, and may be any size from a snapshot to a maximum of 8 1/2 x 11 inches. Each participant provides one print per book so if there were 20 participants, there would be 20 books, each with one print from each participant. Binding costs will be around \$5.00 per book.

# Deadline

Members who wish to participate must declare their interest via e-mail directly to Frank at frank\_townsend@comcast.net or verbally at the OCC holiday party on **December 19**. The end of the holiday party will be the deadline for declaring and we will announce the final count at the end of the party. We will also publish this number to all declared participants.

# **Publishing Party**

The publishing party will be on Saturday, January 26 (note this is a change from last months newsletter) at noon at the Friendly Village Community Center, 1111 Archwood Dr, Olympia. This is party time! Each participant brings their favorite snack, providing us with a "finger food" lunch and an excellent opportunity to become acquainted with other members. In the event you are unable to attend, you may deliver your prints to Frank before the January 7 or send them with another member. Please provide the name of the person who will be present to assemble your Annual for you.

Note: Because we permanently assemble the Annual, all

books must contain their complete contents at the party. It is difficult to add or exchange images with those already included in the binder, so a fully completed Annual, ready for binding is our goal! Please assure that your prints are at the publishing party, ready for assembly on or before the assembly date.

# The Prints

# **Option 1: Mount on Paper Pages**

Photos can be mounted on 8 1/2 by 11 pages with titles, etc. The preferred paper is 24 pound bond or similar. Please create your own pages and mount your prints, ready to bind before the party. You may use materials, colors, etc. of your choice. In that way you can control the placement of the print and information you want included on your page. When mounting, allow a 1/2 to 3/4 inch extra margin ("gutter") along the left hand (long) edge of the page for binding. Archival mounting materials are preferred.

# Option 2: Prints Done Directly on 8 1/2 x 11 Photo Paper

You can bring prints that are done directly on  $8\ 1/2\ x\ 11$  photo paper. We will bind these into the books with no need for other materials. When printing, allow a 1/2 to 3/4 inch extra margin ("gutter") along the left hand (long) edge of the page for binding.

# Note 1:

Regardless of printing method or binding method, please assure your prints are dry and free of any adhesive residue or substances that would harm other prints in the book.

# Note 2:

Please endeavor to get your prints completed well before the party. In years past, last-minute print orders from Costco and others have gone awry preventing some folks' images from being included in the book so allow for possible delays and errors in your prints.

### Note 3:

Most folks like to place the title and the name of the maker of the images somewhere on the mounting (Option 1) or in the print itself (Option 2).

# **Holiday Lights**

It is the time of the year when people decorate their homes and yards with festive lights. Here are some tips for taking pictures of them.

- 1. Take your pictures at twilight. That will give you a little ambient light and your pictures will not have as black a background.
- 2. Use a tripod so that your ISO can be lower. I start with an ISO of 400. Today's cameras take good pictures at ISO as high as 3200, but you will be better off with a lower ISO, longish shutter speed and a tripod.
- 3. I usually set my camera at a relatively wide aperture, let's say somewhere between f/2.8 and f/5.6, set my shutter speed at 1/8 s or less and the ISO at 400. Then I leave the aperture and the ISO fixed and vary my light by changing the shutter speed.
- 4. I set my aperture as wide as I can when I am focusing on a small group of lights with an anchor in front and want to achieve some bokeh in the background. You can get polygon shapes for the bokeh by making the aperture a little smaller. The type of polygon depends on how many blades your lens has. You can also change the shape of the bokeh by making paper cutouts of shapes and putting them in front of the lens. For example, if you want your bokeh to be triangles, cut a triangle out of a piece of construction paper and hold the construction paper in front of the lens.
- 5. LED lights have a fast flicker frequency of 60 Hz. This is fast enough that most of us do not notice it.

The camera does. So, to get a picture that has all the lights and not some of them missing, use a shutter speed below 1/60 s.

One last tip. Use a piece of foam core to block your lens when headlights come through.

Of the four, Pam Hoaglund won Honorable Mention in Traveling Prints for "Old Shoes on Chair" and John Gerecht won 3rd place in Traveling Prints and 3<sup>rd</sup> place in Color Portrait for "Makeup" and also 3<sup>rd</sup> place in Traveling Prints and 3<sup>rd</sup> place in Monochrome for "Black Dress".

# How I Learned to Love the iCamera

My interest in photography goes way back. My first and only, film ILC is a Pentax Spot F with 50mm, 135mm, & 400mm lenses. I slowly adopted to digital, but never boarded the express train of pioneers and early adopters who upgrade with every technological innovation and new model. I used a series of so-called "Point and Shoot" cameras, all of which allowed full manual control, and most of which were Canons to take advantage of the advanced control features in the free Canon Hack Development Kit (CHDK). My first, and only, digital ILC is an Olympus OMD-5 II (4/3 format), 12-40 Pro (24-80mm equivalent), and a 150 (300mm equivalent).

I've been a member of the Olympia Camera Club since the fall 2015. The majority of conversation / discussion I observed and participated in have focused on hardware (usually the latest and greatest): cameras, sensors, lenses, tripods, lighting, etc.; computers, monitors, tablets, backup systems, etc.; printers, papers, ink, etc.; etc. As most "serious" photographers know, phone cameras non-photographers, to take non-photos are (snapshots) of non-subjects (selfies and social subjects) for non-photo use (text and post on social media). Phone cameras aren't "real" cameras and they don't take "real" photos. Like most people, I used my phone camera to take snapshots at family gatherings, pictures of products while shopping to text to my wife, books I wanted to remember, etc. Everything except using it as a "real" camera to take "real" photos.

While on a photo trip through the Southwest, I took several photos a day with my iPhone 6s (8MP sensor and a 30mm (35mm equivalent), f2.8 lens) to text to my family—"this is what I saw today". After returning, I looked at those photos a lot closer, and decided they were actually pretty good. They looked different. I concluded that it was a simple shift in my perspective. The "photo mode" using my Olympus, spilled over to "photo mode" with the iPhone. In short, I treated the iPhone as a "real" camera instead of a snapshot camera.

I experimented taking photos with my iPhone 6s when I didn't have my Olympus – shopping at the farmer's market, walking in the neighborhood, etc. I liked the photos. The 5x7 prints were very nice and I selected a handful and printed 8x10s. I was surprised at how nice they were. I shared them with several club members to get their comments. Everyone agreed the prints were nice and they were also surprised when I told them that I used an iPhone. Several members did not believe the iPhone origin or suggested that I was simply mistaken.

In 2016, I took a 13-week trip, primarily in Central & Eastern Europe. I carried my Olympus OMD-5 II and the 12–40mm Pro lens, *every day*. My carry system (Capture One backpack strap quick release clip) was comfortable and convenient. My gear is much smaller and lighter than the gear that most photographers use. Even so, as the days passed, my setup became more inconvenient, more uncomfortable, and heavier.

After 2 months, I was tired of carrying my gear around every day. I remembered that I had a backup camera — my iPhone 6s. I took more photos with it, experimenting with different light and shooting conditions — landscape, architecture, motion, interior (primarily churches), night, etc. I used the standard Apple camera app for all photos, even though I did not fully understand the app's features. I liked the results a lot.

The day before the entry deadline for the **2017 Thurston** County Fair I had no prepared photos. My wife convinced me to enter some iPhone photos. The next day, I printed (Costco), mounted and submitted entries. Although I had not printed an iPhone image at 16x20, I took the leap based on the excellent results of the 8x10 prints. How would these images stack up to photos taken with "real" cameras? And the Judges say ...?

OK. The judges thought the iPhone photos were "real" enough. Club members were mostly surprised and some simply dismissed or denied the iPhone origin. I think part of the struggle for "traditional" photographers is that if someone accepts the output as a "real" photo, they also must accept the camera used to take the photo as a "real" camera.

My next trip was 9 weeks, primarily in the Balkans, including a 21-day road trip with 23 different hotels. Lots of moving around and lots of walking, 3 to 9.5 miles per day, about 5.5 miles average per day. iPhone ONLY. Yes, there were a few days that I wished I had my "regular" setup, and even a longer telephoto lens. However, my feet and body were REALLY HAPPY the other 60 days.

Just prior to this trip, I upgraded to an iPhone 8, which has a 12MP sensor and a 28mm (35mm equivalent), f1.8 lens. I also downloaded several camera apps: Camera+, Pro Camera, VSCO, Pro HDR X, Night Eyes, Slow Shutter, and Snapseed. The apps are free or minimal cost – the most expensive I believe was \$10. Among other things, the Camera+ app includes complete control of the camera – ISO, shutter speed, exposure compensations, focal point, etc.; has shutter options that include normal, burst, timer, and stabilization (the shutter will not fire if

the camera is not still), which I have found particularly effective; and, allows the user to choose file format, JPEG, TIFF, HEIF and RAW / DNG.

We all know it is a bad idea to go on a trip with a new camera system. Predictably, this trip was a bit challenging because I was learning the new camera apps. However, they are fairly intuitive and, for the most part, the learning experience was positive. I was VERY HAPPY with the results and the convenience/freedom of using the iPhone 8.

NOTE: My wife, who is neither a photographer nor a club member, entered photos (8x10s) that she took on our trip with her iPhone 5. She received 3 ribbons: one 3<sup>rd</sup> Place and 2 HMs.

My most recent trip was only 6 weeks through Italy and France, again with only the iPhone 8. I saw more tourist sites that prohibited all photographs and some that prohibited all bags, including purses and cameras, which must be checked before entry. Again, very happy with the convenience/freedom of carrying the iPhone in my shirt pocket and, more importantly, the results, which I will write about in more detail in the next installment.

I started this journey with an iPhone 6s, which also has a camera, and ended with an iCamera 8, which also has a phone. There is a lot going on out there with phone cameras and lots of **amazing** images on the web.

# PSA PID (Projected Image Division) Interclub Competition

If you have been reading emails from the OCC or attended recent OCC meetings, you are aware that we are venturing into the world of competition with the Photographic Society of America (PSA). The Board has discussed entering the competition several times and finally decided to take the plunge.

The competition year runs from November to May; entry date deadlines are November 1, January 1, March 1 and May 1. We need six different photographers for each of the four competitions. We will be competing as a club against other clubs from around the world for three top spots at the end of the season. Individuals will also receive awards.

I have submitted our makeup images for the November competition. Since these images are makeup, because we were not enrolled in the competition until after the deadline for submission, the images are not eligible for individual awards but will count toward club points. Six club members and one alternate have signed up to submit images for the January 1 competition. If you are one of those who signed up, I need your image by December 15.

In January I will have the signup sheet for the March 1 competition. It will be first come first served for signup so don't miss a meeting if you want to enter the competition.

It is exciting to see the interest so far and we look forward to your wonderful image for the March or May entries! Here's some more information:

You <u>must</u> be an OCC member to participate but do not have to be an individual member of PSA.

- 1. Images are to be digital only. Film images can be scanned into digital.
- 2. Photographic work must be the maker's; no commercial clip art is allowed.
- 3. Category is General. Content is "open" and may include creative images, with all forms of manipulation permitted.
- 4. Color or Monochrome. Monochrome images are those that give the impression of black and white, or black and white plus one fully toned color.
- 5. All submitted images are judged together and are not separated by Color or Monochrome.
- 6. Image Release Form: signed by participating members. It guarantees the images are:

Their own work

They have the necessary model and or property release if ever needed

They give PSA permission to display their images on the PID Interclub website

They understand they alone hold all copyrights

- 7. The image release form is not required if the participant does not wish to have their winning images displayed by PSA on their website or at the PSA Conference.
- 8. Image Size:
  - > Horizontal images will be no more than 1024 pixels wide or 768 pixels tall.
  - > Vertical images will be no more than 768 pixels tall.
  - > JPEG format only, with no file size restrictions.
  - > sRGB color space is recommended Suggested file name: title of image\_photographer name.
  - > DO NOT put a watermark on the image.






















# **Membership Dues**

# Images for the Website

Pam Hoaglund and I have been collaborating to put some of your images onto the club's website. Each month Pam posts a few of our members' images in the Newsletter and then she sends those images to me to post on a page of the OCC website. I put them in groups, depending on how many she sends, so sometimes there will be a single page for one month and other pages include multiple months. You can find these images under Photo Galleries>Images from Newsletter.

As you look through the images you might notice some images are large, some are very small. This is why Pam asks for a specific size for the newsletter and why consistent sizing also works best for me on the website. Please send your images to Pam sized to 1024 pixels on the long edge. Make sure they are watermarked with your name, and in the sRGB color space. Also, please name our files with a title and your name. Our preferred file name format is "Title by Your Name" or "Title Your Name". Here's an example: Painted Hills by John Doe. If you spell and punctuate properly, I don't have to spend time making changes to your file names before I upload them and you get the proper credit for your images. Oh, and just so you know, your images are "right click protected" so they can't be downloaded by others. Thanks for your cooperation.

# Flickr Changes

As I noted in last month's newsletter, Flickr is making some changes to their terms and conditions that may affect you. Instead of giving us 1 Terabyte of storage, they will now be limiting free accounts to 1000 photos. If you want to keep more than 1000 photos in your Flickr account, you will need to upgrade to a PRO account for \$49.99 per year. Beginning January 8, Flickr will start deleting your older photos if your free account contains more than the 1000 limit.

Over the years, our website has been very dependent on your Flickr images for the content of field trip galleries, the club activity gallery, and your personal galleries. I am investigating other options for getting content to our website for those galleries that will remove that dependency without adding any cost to you. I'll hopefully have more information for you on this by next month.


