Every year, OCC members get together to assemble a permanent collection of their recent photographic work. We do this by publishing our Annual, a booklet to which we all contribute our photographs. There is a copy of the Annual published for each contributor so each person gets a copy to keep. We have found these books to be excellent keepsakes and inspirations. We will assemble the book at a gathering at the Friendly Village Community Center, accompanied by a "finger food" lunch. We would encourage you to get involved in this enjoyable activity. It provides a good deal of fun, a collection of your colleagues' work and a look at where we all were, photographically, in 2019. The details are as follows:

The Annual

Each Annual is made up of one image from each participating OCC member in good standing. Participation is voluntary, of course. It's nice but not required that the images were created during 2019. Images may be created by any photo process and may be any size from a snapshot to a maximum of 8 1/2 x 11 inches. Each participant provides one page per book so if there were 20 participants, there would be 20 books, each with one page from each participant. Binding costs will be around \$2.50 to \$3.00 per book.

Deadline

Members who wish to participate must declare their interest via e-mail directly to Frank at frank_townsend@comcast.net or verbally at the OCC holiday party on December 17. The end of the holiday party will be the deadline for declaring and we will announce the final count at the end of the party. We will also publish this number to all declared participants.

Publishing Party

The publishing party will be on Sunday, January 19, 2020 at noon at the Friendly Village Community Center, 1111

Archwood Dr, Olympia. This is party time! Each participant brings their favorite snack, providing us with a "finger food" lunch and an excellent opportunity to become acquainted with other members. In the event you are unable to attend, you may deliver your prints to Frank before the party or send them with another member. Please provide the name of the person who will be present to assemble your Annual for you. Note: Because we permanently assemble the Annual, all books must contain their complete contents at the party. It is difficult to add or exchange images with those already included in the binder, so a fully completed Annual, ready for binding is

our goal! Please assure that your prints are at the publishing party, ready for assembly on or before the assembly date.

The Prints

Option 1: Mount on Paper Pages

Photos can be mounted on 8 1/2 by 11 pages with titles, etc. The preferred paper is 24 pound bond or similar. Please create your own pages and mount your prints, ready to bind before the party. You may use materials, colors, etc. of your choice. In that way you can control the placement of the print and information you want included on your page. When mounting, allow a 1/2 to 3/4 inch extra margin ("gutter") along the left hand (long) edge of the page for binding. Archival mounting materials are preferred.

Option 2: Prints Done Directly on 8 1/2 x 11 Photo Paper You can bring prints that are done directly on 8 1/2 x 11 photo paper. We will bind these into the books with no need for other materials. When printing, allow a 1/2 to 3/4 inch extra margin ("gutter") along the left hand (long) edge of the page for binding.

Note 1:

Regardless of printing method or binding method, please assure your prints are dry and free of any adhesive residue or substances that would harm other prints in the book.

Note 2:

Please endeavor to get your prints completed well before the party. In years past, last minute print orders from Costco and others have gone awry preventing some folks' images from being included in the book so allow for possible delays and errors in your prints.

Note 3:

Most folks like to place the title and the name of the maker of the images somewhere on the mounting (Option 1) or in the print itself (Option 2).

Lodge Life by Ron Jones

It was my first time at Grand Teton National Park (GTNP) and Jackson Lodge. I was a bit overwhelmed walking into the lodge and seeing the Tetons - right there! BAM! Such an amazing setting. I was enjoying the views and the lodge itself, while looking for interesting shots. As with most street type photography, we often only get a fleeting moment to capture a scene. It grabs you and you must be ready. Get a shot, then try to improve. Don't try to improve first, because the scene will typically change and you'll be skunked.

I'd been roaming the inside of the lodge, capturing scenes and details and all the while looking for more interesting compositions. I knew I wanted a shot from inside looking out with the mountain range. However, I wanted it squared up to the windows so it would have nice symmetry. The problem was, right smack dab in the middle of the room, where I wanted to be, there was a giant glass display, a sort of terrarium thing with a wide railing all the way around it. I had a shot that included it but it put me too far back into the lodge and it was cluttered looking. Getting the shot I wanted would require me standing on something, such as a table, chair, or that terrarium

railing. Yes, I was contemplating and seriously considering if I could pull it off. All I needed was for all official people to be looking elsewhere for a second.

As I scanned the room, looking for who might chase me off when I jumped up on furniture or railing, I noticed the women playing a game with kids and the guys near the window. I pulled the camera to my eye, framed the shot, quickly exposed for the highlights (shooting aperture priority), waited for a couple people to move out of the scene, and got two frames before what seemed like a hoard move into the scene. And just that quick, everything changed. At that point, I decided it was not worth risking standing on furniture. And generally, just a bad idea anyway.

The image is a shot from inside Jackson Lodge in Grand Teton National Park, September, 2018. It's a single shot. Nikon d810 with nikkor 24-120 f4 at 35mm, 1/320 sec, f10, ISO-640, minus 2ev. Processed in Lightroom. Brought up shadows, and various other global adjustments and some local adjustments.

New Member Profile: : Jeff Martin

What or who brought you to the club?

I have enjoyed photography for many years. For me, it is

one of the only activities where I can lose sight of the outside world and focus solely on the activity. For those moments, I am truly grateful.

Now that I am retired, I wanted to pursue photography in more depth. I purchased a DSLR in June 2019 graduating from several previous point-and-shoot / superzoom cameras. The Olympia Camera Club seemed like a



great way to meet others with similar interests. I especially like that the focus of the club is mentoring.

How did you get interested in photography?

In the mid 70's I purchased a Fuji SLR while attending college. It went with me on several road trips although the cost of film and its development was a limitation. During the summer in the 1970's and early 80's I worked for the US Forest Service on a hotshot crew. The crew traveled extensively throughout the western US working on large forest fires. For several years I carried a Kodak disposable slide film camera while working on the fireline. I carried the camera inside of a grocery produce bag which then went into a small canvas belt bag. My first digital camera was a Canon point-and-shoot which was quickly followed by a Fuji superzoom. The Nisqually Wildlife Refuge became a favorite spot to capture landscapes, animals and flowers.

I traveled throughout Washington while working for the Washington State Library. My workgroup provided services to all types of libraries throughout the state. I carried a Sony point-and-shoot which worked well for low-light indoor pictures without the need to use a flash. All of these activities provided a wealth of opportunity to develop and hold my interest in photography.

What kind of photography do you like to do?

I am somewhat reserved when it comes to taking photos of people I don't know well. My primary interest is in landscapes, animals, flowers and less frequently, buildings.

What equipment is in your camera bag?

I have an Ape Case ACPRO 1600 travel bag which is small enough for an airplane's carry-on compartment but large enough for all of my equipment. Inside is my Nikon D750 with a 24 – 70mm kit lens, a 200 – 500mm zoom, a 105mm macro lens and a 50mm prime.

What post processing programs do you use?

I use Adobe Photoshop Elements and Lightroom. I feel proficient in cropping and am slowly learning the rest.

What do you want to learn from the club?

I want to continue to grow my skills with the DSLR and with these software programs. The recent presentation by Pam Hoaglund using On1 is a perfect example. It allowed insight into how I can use Elements and Lightroom to enhance my photography. While the individual steps may be somewhat different in each program, the presentation provided several ideas on how to use my software more effectively.



Member Profile: Dennis Plank

What or who brought you to the club?

Meredith Rafferty brought me in as a guest speaker on

bird photography. We both volunteer on the prairies and she'd seen a number of my photographs used on the note cards we sell at Prairie Appreciation Day. I had been aware of the club awhile, but didn't think I had the time or energy for another activity. However, the warmth and enthusiasm of the club members when I gave my presentation was enough to



make me want to return. I've been coming back since then.

How did you get interested in photography?

While my parents had a box camera, I didn't really get into it until I was in the Navy in the early 70's. I bought a Pentax Spotmatic II from a shipmate and started taking pictures and reading books on it. I stuck with Pentax

until I went digital when Canon came out with the 6.3 MP Rebel at under \$1000.

What kind of photography do you like to do?

When I first got started I did mostly scenic's and slowly gravitated toward wildflowers. When my wife and I got together 14 years ago, she got me interested in birding and encouraged me to participate in the photo critique website that was then called NaturePhotographers.net (now NaturePhotographers.network), and I was really impressed with the bird photography. I ended up trying it and liking it and I've been doing mostly that with some flowers since then.

What equipment is in your camera bag?

Mostly Canon. My primary bird body is an EOS 7D Mark II and I use a 5D Mark III for flower, macro and landscapes. I picked up a used Sony a6500 body last year and have thus far used it with an adapter and my Canon mount lenses. My current birding lens is a Sigma 150-600 mm Contemporary and for Macro, I use a Canon 180 mm f/3.5 macro. For other stuff, I have Canon 28 -70mm, 70-200 f/4, and 300 f/4. I also have a ton of other gear with multiple tripods and heads, monopods, groundpods, three blinds, etc. etc.

What post processing programs do you use?

I use Lightroom, primarily as an organizational tool and for Raw processing, and do detailed processing in Photoshop with the aid of a couple of the older Topaz Plugins. For birds, my usual workflow includes selecting the bird and perch and placing them on separate layers to process independently of the background and I really like Topaz Remask for that task. I also like Topaz Detail for bringing out fine feather structure. I'll also use Tony Kuyper's Luminosity Mask plugins if appropriate. For focus stacking I've used both Zerene Stacker and Helicon Focus.

What do you want to learn from the club?

I'd really like to work on my landscape photography as I just don't seem to have a feel for composition in that arena. As a subset of that, I want to figure out how to make a field of flowers look good-I'm never happy with my results. I'd also be interested in learning more about processing software alternatives such as ON1 and DxO. Timelapse, video and sound recording also look interesting.

After downloading, it had placed over 150 icons on my desktop. Being ever so helpful, my spouse decided to uninstall and reinstall it for me. Sounds easy enough doesn't it? But, sadly NO. Almost all my pictures, which I kept in folders on my desktop were deleted also. I was not a happy camper!!!

I had backed up all my photos through 2018, so only the 2019 photos were affected. But they were my best.

Fortunately, my son is a computer specialist. On Thanksgiving he bought a program that should recover all, or most of my photos. At this moment it is still backing up and syncing to my new Google cloud. I am not very hopeful, but time will tell. I can see where some photos were permanently deleted. Of course these were the ones I wanted most of all.


So don't be like Tammy. Back up everything now.

You should ideally store photos both online and on two external hard drives (one stored locally and another at a different location). Cloud services offer one very important feature: automatic backups. There are several well known cloud services such as: Apple iCloud, Google Photos, Amazon's Prime Photos, and Dropbox.

External hard drives range in price from \$50-\$350. They are like the storage that is built into your computer, except they're connected externally.

Consider these tips when backing up your photos. 1-Label folders, 2-Keep a folder of your favorite shots, 3-Add context, 4-Start by backing up today's photo's, 5-Test your back up periodically.

Don't forget to back up all of your cell phone shots also.


The meeting was called to order by President Bruce Livingston at 6:30 PM with a quorum present.




