Practical Photography January 8, 2019 7-9 pm

January 8th brings us together again for another great session in Practical Photography. In August we asked club members to fill out a survey to let us know the topics they would like to learn about in our Practical Photography sessions. An area that received a high percentage point of interest was learning how to prepare images for competition and learning how to critique photographs to improve their composition and technical quality. These topics will be addressed by this month's presenters, John Gerecht, Pam Hoaglund and Rosalind Philips. All three have won recognition with their photographs when entering them in competitions. We will discuss how to determine which image in your vast inventory of images is most worthy of competition, a brief discussion on composition (please note that a special session just on composition will be done in February), how a Judge determines what constitutes a ribbon-awarding image, and what is the best way to present the image, discussing best size, mounting and businesses that provide photograph mounting services. Each speaker will talk about their experience entering images into competition and show some of their award-winning photographs.

All members are encouraged to ask questions and provide input as to their own experiences when entering competitions. I'm looking forward to seeing you.

www.skagiteagles.com. The boat photo tours cost \$95 for the jet sled and \$75 for the drift boat.






2018 Annual Publishing Party

If you entered an image in the November 2018 or January 2019 competition you can't enter again in this competition year.

Deadline to have images to me for the March competition will be February 10, 2019

It is exciting to see the interest so far and we look forward to your wonderful image for the March or May entries! Here's some more information:

You <u>must</u> be an OCC member to participate but do not have to be an individual member of PSA.

- 1. Images are to be digital only. Film images can be scanned into digital.
- 2. Photographic work must be the maker's; no commercial clip art is allowed.
- 3. Category is General. Content is "open" and may include creative images, with all forms of manipulation permitted.

- 4. Color or Monochrome. Monochrome images are those that give the impression of black and white, or black and white plus one fully toned color.
- 5. All submitted images are judged together and are not separated by Color or Monochrome.
- 6. Image Release Form: signed by participating members. It guarantees the images are:

Their own work

They have the necessary model and or property release if ever needed

They give PSA permission to display their images on the PID Interclub website

They understand they alone hold all copyrights

7. Image Size:

- > Horizontal images will be no more than 1024 pixels wide or 768 pixels tall.
- > Vertical images will be no more than 768 pixels tall.
- > JPEG format only, with no file size restrictions.
- > sRGB color space is recommended Suggested file name: title of image photographer name.
- > DO NOT put a watermark on the image.

Getting Your Photography Ready for the New Year

Happy New Year everyone. There are a few things that you should consider doing to get yourself ready for 2019 photography.

- Check the date and time on your camera. Most cameras turn over to the New Year and daylight savings time automatically, but it is good idea to check.
- 2. Check that your copyright year in the metadata of Lightroom or whatever processing program you use is correct. I forgot to do this when I processed my first pictures of 2019, so I now I need to go back and correct the metadata.
- 3. Do spring cleaning on your equipment. I always go through my camera bag and make sure that all my equipment is there and that it is clean. I especially clean the outside body of my camera. I also take this as an opportunity to lighten my camera bag by removing those things that are nice to have but I never use. I also tighten all the screws and bolts on my tripod.

Learning by Borrowing

I went to Arizona in October to check on my mom. Thinking I would be too busy with Mom to go out and explore the area I decided to not bring my camera, but then I found myself with a free day and no camera. Luckily my friends let me borrow their camera, but their camera was a Nikon and I shoot Canon. I spent the night reading the manual and taking pics of the bedroom as I tried to figure out the camera.

The next day I went to the Desert Botanical Garden in Phoenix. The buttons on the Nikon are in different spots from my Canon so I kept switching the wrong thing. The frustration of using the camera caused me to slow down and think about each photo. I thought about if I really wanted to take that image and how did I want the image to look. Although I struggled with the camera settings throughout the day, I enjoyed the gardens very much. My favorite image is a flower bathed in light from a colored glass sculpture. If you ever get the chance you should go and plan to spend the whole day.

Once I got home and viewed the images on my computer, I noticed that the Nikon seemed to do much better in low light than my camera. I reviewed the specs for both cameras and although they are not identical, they are close. I have fought to get good images in low light in the past and thought the problem was my camera. But now I wondered if it was something else. I mentioned this on the club's Facebook page and quickly had many responses that helped me to understand that it was the lens I was using. The widest my lens could go was to f4.5 whereas the Nikon lens could go to f3.5.

So, what did I learn by borrowing a different brand of camera? I learned more about the difference between f3.5 and f4.5. I understood a smaller number meant that less of the entire image would be in focus and that more light would get in to the sensor. But I learned that if you are not on top of what you are taking a photo of the smaller number shouldn't affect the results as much as I had thought. I learned if it's not something that might run away, to slow down and think about what I want from this photo. I also learned that this group is very supportive and patient with people like me who race ahead and miss some of the finer details we should have learned at the beginning.

Night Photography

Lately, there has been a lot of beautiful night photography on the OCC Facebook Group and so I think that an article on night photography is in order. The October article on long exposure photography also applies. Winter is my favorite time of year for doing night photography because it gets dark early; no waiting until midnight.

The most important piece of equipment for night photography is your tripod. A good sturdy tripod is essential so that your camera is rock steady. Another piece of essential equipment is a remote release so that the camera does not shake when you press the shutter button. If you do not have a remote release, use your 2-second timer. Know your camera controls. It is really frustrating to have to hunt around for buttons and dials in the dark. Be careful in turning on your flashlight to look at the controls so that you don't introduce stray light into someone else's photograph. I generally set up my camera before I leave home or before I get out of the car. I set the ISO to 100, the aperture to f/8 and the shutter speed to 10 sec as a starting place if I am doing light trails or landscapes. If I want star bursts, then I set the aperture to f/16 or f/22. If I am shooting the night sky, then I set the ISO to 3200, the aperture as wide as it will go, hopefully at f/2.8 and the shutter speed somewhere between 15 sec and 30 sec.

There are lots of places around Olympia to do night photography. My favorites are the Capitol Campus and Percival Landing. Other places are the 4th Ave Bridge (great for light trails), the fountain on 4th Ave, and the overpass that crosses Capitol Blvd, the Port of Olympia, and West Bay Drive. Other places to go are the Foss Waterway and the Museum of Glass in Tacoma, and Alki Beach and the waterfront in Seattle. Bridges make for good photographs also.

A technique I like to do at night is blurs. I use a zoom lens and turn the ring so that the lens zooms in and out. I also take the camera off the tripod and move the camera in circles, right and left to make interesting patterns.

Night photography is lots of fun. I hope you do some over the winter and share your results in the Facebook Group. Also, please share your favorite night time locations.











