Center for Natural Lands Management Seed Photography Field Trip Saturday, January 25, 2020 9:30am to 3:00pm

Join us Saturday, January 25th for a day of Macro/micro photography using native plant seeds as our subjects. We'll be meeting at CNLM's Shotwell's Landing Native Plant Nursery located 1.8 miles south of the town of Littlerock on Littlerock road. If you're traveling south, you'll see the raised beds and greenhouses on the right and the entrance is at the south end of the complex. We'll show you where to park. Northbound, you'll see a greenhouse on your left and the entrance is just before it. If you get to the Capitol City Rifle and Pistol Club sign, you've gone too far. The address is: 14447 Littlerock Rd., Rochester, WA 98579 and it works properly in Google maps.

We will get **started at 9:30.** I'll kick the last stragglers out **no later than 3:00**. If you want to spend the whole day, bring a lunch and definitely bring something to drink.

Note that we will be working in a side room of an active seed cleaning facility. There is likely to be dust in the air. Also, bathroom facilities consist of a single portapotty.

You'll want to bring a macro lens or macro auxiliary lenses and/or extension tubes, an external flash with a cable if you have it, extra batteries, a blank memory card (CF or SD) and possibly a USB drive. While some seeds, like the *Marah oreganus* (Oregon manroot) are large (½ inch diameter), most are quite small and some are tiny (one dedicated volunteer counted 1200 Castilleja levisecta (Golden Paintbrush) seeds in 1/8 teaspoon), so I will be bringing a dissection microscope with a Canon camera converter and I have a Canon to Sony adapter. People with those makes can use their cameras with my microscope. Others can use my camera and put their cards in it - it accepts SD and CF. CNLM is also providing a microscope with a camera, but I suspect it's builtin and displays directly on a computer-hence the USB drive (I haven't used it yet, but I'll have an update at the Practical Photography meeting on that). A tripod that lets you shoot straight down is also helpful. Some of the seeds have a shiny outer coating, so a polarizer might help as well.

The photographs included here were taken 15 years ago, well before I knew about focus stacking, so I'm hoping to improve on them markedly in this session and I look forward to exploring this kind of photography with all of you.









Time to Pay Your Dues



Photography Resources, Lynda.com, and Your Local Library



Do you have a library card from the Timberland Regional Library? If so, you should be able to access Lynda.com and all of its training resources for free.

Or, do you have a library card from a different public library? Thanks to the Washington State Library and funding support from the federal Institute of Museum and Library Services, Lynda.com is potentially available from any public library within Washington State.

The information in this article is specific to using Timberland Regional Library's website (https://www.trl.org).

To find Lynda.com from the trl.org link, find Learn in the set of menus to the right of the Timberland Regional Library logo. If you are using a small screen or are not using a full screen, you should see a menu symbol to the right of the logo.



Select the Learn dropdown and then Online Courses. You will find Lynda.com listed in the Online Learning Reference Database Results.

If this is the first time accessing Lynda.com, you then enter your Library Card Number and Library Card PIN and click on login. You will then be prompted to set up a very simple profile. Once done, you should have access to all of Lynda.com's resources.

Get to the photography resources either by conducting a search - or - just to the right of the Lynda.com logo you will see the Library and its drop-down menu. One of the items in the drop-down is Photography. You will find



hundreds of courses and thousands of video tutorials. Browse by topic, software, author, and skill level. Do you need or desire closed-captioning? Some resources are also close-captioned. In either case a transcript can be seen below the video.

The resources range from a few minutes in length for a video to several hours in length for a complete course.

On the Photography Training and Tutorials page (https://www.lynda.com/Photography-training-tutorials/70-0.html) you will also find News Releases, Learning Paths, Documentaries, and Weekly Series.

Explore and have fun learning something new.

ON1 for Those New to Photo Processing

There are so many choices in software for photo processing that it can be hard to decide which one is best for you. Luckily you can try them for free for at least a week, but does that give you enough time to decide? When you are still new to using photo processing software the choices are mind blowing. How can you decide on the software when you're not sure how it works? When you're moving sliders and choosing options as a newbie you might get lost in the selections and still not get the results you want.

I tried the Adobe products Lightroom and Photoshop. Both are powerful tools for photographers but tend to have a big learning curve. I was going to try Luminar but I had computer problems that prevented the program from working. But by then, I had begun a trial of ON1 and decided to stay with it.


ON1 can do a lot for all users. No, it does not have all the bells and whistles of the Adobe products but so far, I don't miss those things. So, what makes ON1 my choice? It just seems easier for me. This may be because I am a PC person first and tend to run screaming from the room when someone wants me to work on a Mac. The presets feel more like playing. I can click on each preset and see my image change. It is very easy to revert to my original image or just take a bit of the effects out. The

presets have helped me learn what each slider does. I pick the preset that is close to what I want and then move the preset sliders back and forth. Since the image is usually almost what I want I am less distracted by the whole image and can really see what that slider does to my image. When I want to really see some changes, I can go into the Effects tab and click on Add Filter. Now that is where the playing really begins.


Here are my quick tips for using ON1 during your free trial period; hopefully they will help you see if this is the

program for you. The left side of your Edit screen has the tools most people are expecting to see in their photo editing software. But look just to the right of those and you will see the tab Presets.

The Presets tab will give you many options for how you may want your image to look. Sometimes, because the sample images are so small, it is hard to really see how that preset will change your image. Once you have selected a group of



presets that you think will work for you, ON1 has a little spot to click on that looks like a tiny four paned window. This will bring up larger samples to pick from.

On the right side of your screen you will see a panel of sliders to play with to change your image. Since I am new at this, I keep asking myself what do they do and how will each affect my image?

After you have selected a preset that is close to what you

want but not exactly, you can work with those changes by clicking on the Effects tab. Now the sliders that you see are what the preset used to change your image. You can move these sliders and see changes just like you could in the normal Develop mode but here you might see options that you (I) would never have thought to use.

Once you are in the Effects tab look back to the left side of your image and you will notice a new option called Filters next to Presets.





The filters tab will allow you to add or change your image. There are too many options to list. Here again is the tiny four paned window that will make those examples larger.

Not one of the many photo processing programs is perfect for everyone. Do take the time to try each for free and step through a few tutorials to help you decide which program will work best for yo




