

- 2. The images must be between 1024 and 2048 pixels on the long side. The resolution should not exceed 72 dpi.
- 3. Favorite/Best of 2019-20 images. Name your images as Bxx Name ImageName.jpg.
 - a. B means Favorite/Best of 2019-20, xx is the number of the image, Name is your name and ImageName is the name of the image. For example, the third image I submit would be named, B03 RosalindPhilips BergyBit.jpg.
 - b. Please include a self Identification Image as your 6th image.
- 4. Please put your images in the Images for Annual Meeting folder inside the OCC Member Sharing folder on Dropbox.
- 5. Images are due no later than midnight on June 9, 2020.

A Special Virtual Field Trip Evening Sharing: The Palouse June 30 at 7pm on GoToMeeting:

On June 30 we are going to take a special virtual field trip to "The Palouse." What is "The Palouse?" Why would you go there and what would you photograph? Help OCC members who have not been to "The



Palouse" see what an amazing place it is to photograph. Tractors, rolling wheat and canola fields, Palouse Waterfall, grain storage structures, barns and a big sky are all part of this unique agricultural landscape.

On June 8 we will send you an email with the details for submitting your images taken in the Palouse.

click on it. When the website opens click on "Join My Meeting".

July 9, 2020 – Olympic Peninsula (Hwy 101 loop)

This virtual field trip will encompass a large area as we will accept images taken anywhere along Hwy 101 on the Olympic Peninsula. This will include places like Port Townsend, Fort Worden, Hurricane Ridge, Deer Park, the ocean beaches, the Hoh Rain Forest, etc. You will receive an email on July 2 with all the details for submitting your images.



August 6, 2020 City of Olympia

This virtual field trip will have you show the various photographic sites in and around the City of Olympia. You will receive an email on July 30 with all the details for submitting your images.





September 3, 2020 Virtual Field Trip to the Skagit Valley and the Islands

This virtual field trip will take us to the area north of Seattle and will include the Skagit Valley, Whidbey Island, the San Juan Islands, Mt Baker area, and other photographic sites north of Seattle, south of Canada and west of the Cascades. This covers a pretty wide and diversi-

Changes to Our Field Trip Galleries

In the past we've used Flickr groups to display our field trip galleries. There are links to every field trip we've taken since December of 2013 on the Field Trip Galleries page. It's so nice to be able to look back to see images from those long ago group outings, but things have changed at Flickr since they were bought by SmugMug. Free accounts are now limited to 1000 photos. Some members are pushing up against that limit and have expressed concerns about uploading more images just to get them into field trip galleries.

To solve that dilemma, I've developed a way for you to upload your field trip images directly to our website. The process is fairly simple. You just need to log into the OCC website and in the Members Only Area you'll find a link called "Add to Field Trip Galleries". All the instructions are on that page. Your images should be 1024 px on the long side and 2mb or less in size. They should also be watermarked with your name for easy identification. There is a pull down menu to select the field trip you wish to upload to.

Since right now we're only doing Virtual Field trips, many of you will be able to contribute. Right now you can contribute to the Columbia River Gorge. Links to all our field trips are listed on the website under PHOTO GALLERIES>FIELD TRIP GALLERIES.

There really isn't much we can do about moving the older Flickr galleries. I'm hoping most of the images that are contained in them will remain there, but from here on out, we'll be using this new procedure for field trips. If all goes well, we'll consider moving personal galleries to our website as well.

Photographing the Prairie: A Project

As with all the other special activities and festivals this year, we had to cancel Prairie Appreciation Day for what would have been the 25th annual event. When the board of Friends of Puget Prairies met (practicing social distancing) to make that decision just before the Stay Home order came through, we discussed what other means there were to keep people interested in the prairies and make sure that the event didn't drop off peoples' calendars permanently, particularly our regular volunteers. One of the members suggested that we try to come up with some kind of "virtual" PAD. Someone else suggested that a Blog http://www.prairieappreciationday.org/blog/ would be a good idea. Since I do the website and am the resident "photographer" on the board, guess who got the assignment?

Luckily we have the website through a good local techie who specializes in small businesses and non-profits, so he was able to set the basic blog up quickly. Also, luckily, the Center for Natural Lands Management had a new Americorps volunteer who was willing to do the dirty work of getting it looking good and putting up the first several posts (she also wrote great directions for the latter). That left me with the job of creating content and editing that brought in from others. The way things fell out, the person who suggested the whole thing is the recruiter of blog writers on special topics, while I try to fill in with the general progression of the seasons.

Since my forte is most decidedly **NOT** landscape photography, I've been concentrating on what I think I do reasonably competently: birds and flowers, with an occasional bug or three thrown in. However, there have been occasions when the blog required that I step outside my comfort zone as in this panorama of an area that had been burned last year on the Glacial Heritage Preserve.



The project has made me a much better and more dedicated observer, because I've promised myself to try to cover it as thoroughly as I can with reduced access to the prairies (now hopefully a thing of the past). Since I didn't want to encourage people to violate the closures, I got permission to visit a couple of CNLM's private preserves. These photos are from their Tenalquot preserve:





With the almost daily inspection of our own prairie, I've become more aware of the timing of events as in this excerpt from a post from April 13th:

"...you'll see just how many prairie flowers are starting to bloom now. All these flowers come at the same time that the Savannah Sparrows and White-crowned Sparrows start singing on territory and most of our winter birds have gone except for the pairs that set up their territories here, so my bird feeding station is getting very little attention. However, the first three male Goldfinches passed through on the 11th, so that horde won't be far behind."





It's also made me think about elements of the prairie that I haven't noticed before. For instance, this is the season of spittlebugs. You'll see their little bubble houses on plant stems all over the prairies, often so numerous that your boots and pant legs get soaked walking through them on a dry day. I've always thought they were cool, but had never noticed that they seem to really like the

Oxeye daisies (an invasive) or thought much about how they make those bubble houses (the theory is they help deter predators and prevent themselves from drying out). So I pulled a daisy with a spittlebug house in a convenient location, stuck it in a beer bottle with some water, removed most of the bubbles with a tissue and proceeded to take 400 odd photographs at 3 second intervals (thank you, Intervalometer!) and turn them into a time-lapse: https://youtu.be/B3rix- 0Nsg

The spittlebug was returned to the wild unharmed to carry on its life.

Or did you ever wonder how dense spiderdom can be: This one was pure serendipity. This area of our property had been mowed recently as a firebreak (though the front yard looked the same), the spiders must have been incredibly dense, and there was a late night fog that disappeared with the first sun leaving very heavy dew. My wife, Michelle, dubbed it Spider Frost.



In conclusion, if you're into nature photography, I'd recommend picking an area that's handy and following it as closely as you can. It's a wonderful exercise and a great chance to increase your knowledge of what's happening around you. And it's addictive.

I know that after this is over, I'll be starting a nature blog of my own.

We hope you enjoy the trip....
























































Olympia Camera Club Business Meeting Draft June 2, 2020, 6:30pm to 8:30pm GoToMeeting


The meeting was called to order by President Bruce Livingston at 6:30 with a quorum present.
