

Requirements for Entering Image in PSA Interclub Competition

You <u>must</u> be an OCC member to participate but do not have to be an individual member of PSA.

Entry Guidelines:

Images are to be digital only. Film images can be scanned into digital.

Photographic work must be the maker's; no commercial clip art is allowed.

Category is General. Content is "open" and may include creative images, with all forms of manipulation permitted.

Color or Monochrome. Monochrome images are those that give the impression of black and white, or black and white plus one fully toned color.

All submitted images are judged together and are not separated by Color or Monochrome.

Image Release Form: signed by participating members. It guarantees the images are:

Their own work

They have the necessary model and or property release if ever needed

They give PSA permission to display their images on the PID Interclub website

They understand they alone hold all copyrights

The image release form is not required if the participant does not wish to have their winning images displayed by PSA on their website or at the PSA Conference.

Image Size:

Horizontal images will be no more than 1024 pixels wide or 768 pixels tall.

Vertical images will be no more than 768 pixels tall.

JPEG format only, with no file size restrictions.

sRGB color space is recommended Suggested file name: title of image_photographers name. DO NOT put a watermark on the image.

2019 Olympia Camera Club Official Scavenger Hunt Rules

This year, members will have two ways to participate in Banquet Slide Show entertainment.

Submit one image for each of the 15 words below. You many take as many images as you like and do as much processing as you like, but you can only submit one image for each word.

OR

Submit 10-15 of your favorite/best images taken between 6/1/2018 and 6/12/2019. You may do as much processing as you like on the images.

Rules

All images must be JPEGS – no RAW or TIFF images.

The images must be 1024 pixels on the long side. The resolution should not exceed 72 dpi.

Scavenger Hunt Images. Name your images as Sxx Name word.jpg where

S means scavenger hunt, xx is the number of the word and word is the category. For example, an image submitted for the 5th word Plaid would be named S05 RosalindPhilips Plaid.jpg.

Please include a list of your images with descriptions.

Favorite/Best of 2018-19 images. Name your images as Bxx Name ImageName.jpg.

B means Favorite/Best of 2018-19, xx is the number of the image, Name is your name and ImageName is the name of the image. For example the eighth image I submit would be named,

B08_RosalindPhilips_BergyBit.jpg.
Please include a self Identification Image as your 16th image.

Please burn your images to a CD or DVD or thumb drive.

Crystal Springs Rhododendron Garden (aka Wood Duck Heaven)

I have an on-line photography acquaintance that lives in Portland and has always posted wonderful water level duck portraits, particularly Wood Ducks. We finally met in person at Ridgefield NWR a while back and he invited us to come down and visit his favorite pond in Portland. The Crystal Springs Rhododendron Garden is between 99E and Reed College and contains two ponds and a lake, the other border of the lake being a golf course. The paths have access to the pond edges with room to lie down and photograph from about a foot above water level and plenty of room to avoid the pedestrians which are not all that numerous in the winter. Note that the edges are gravel and can be a bit muddy from ducks jumping out of the water. Grubby clothes or ground cloths and elbow pads are recommended.

There is a pair of nesting Bald Eagles at the gardens and now that they're setting up housekeeping a number of the winter species are departing. However, the Wood Ducks are in residence in good numbers all year.

This is an urban park and the children, young and old, feed the ducks regularly, so they are completely unafraid and will come toward you if you look like you have food. Those with quick reflexes can get flight shots of approaching ducks. This photo shows part of a 30 foot long parade of ducks following a young boy scattering feed behind him.



When we were there on March 5th, the male Wood Ducks were in prime plumage as in these two images.





However the females have their own beauty even when they're not showing the subtle iridescence that this one is showing.



The Mallards, as in most duck ponds, are omnipresent. While common, they have a beauty of their own.





In addition to the ducks, the Pied-billed Grebes are fun, though they don't come in for food like the Canada Geese do.





In addition to the waterfowl, I saw Stellars Jays, Ruby Crowned Kinglets, Varied Thrushes and Towhees without really looking.

A word of caution: If you go, do not leave anything in sight in your car. Our host had his car broken into and an empty backpack stolen while we were there.

New Member Profile: Ben Robinson

What or who brought you to the club?

I came to the club looking for a group of fellow photographers that I could learn from, hang out with and use as a sounding board for critique on my photos, my technique and my compositions.



How did you get interested in photography?

In 2007 I bought a fixed lens Canon from Costco. As I come from an artistic family; painters, sculptors, sewers and musicians, my own artistic side started to emerge as I started taking photos. I quickly realized I couldn't get the images I was seeing in my brain to come out through that camera. My wife bought me a Canon T5 for Christmas one year, my first interchangeable lens camera. What post processing programs do you use?

Primarily I use Luminar 2018 for my photo processing. One drawback to that program was no HDR and no panoramic ability. On my first club meeting I learned about Affinity Photo and bought it. Now I can do those!!



What do you want to learn from the club?

I'd like to learn more about composition, processing tricks, good places to shoot and ultimately produce competition worthy photos. Most of all I'd just like to make some photography friends!

Composition and Cropping

Bruce Livingston showed several parts of Art Wolf's "Another Look" video produced by Creative Live, at the General Meeting on February 26th. Wolf's style of critiquing involves using Lightroom to strengthen the composition and lighting of an image. He says that a good image creates movement of the eye and that we can deliberately influence the movement of the eye through composition and lighting. Wolf starts by seeing if the image could be strengthened by cropping. He looked to diminish distractions, apply the rule of thirds if applicable and have the main subject situated so that the eye goes from left to right. He also advocates constraining your crop to standard sizing so that it is not as obvious that you cropped. He generally feels that many landscapes benefit from the application of the neutral density tool in Lightroom. Wolf's workflow during the video was crop, adjust exposure, highlights and shadows, white and blacks and maybe apply a neutral density gradient. The ultimate goal is not to "save" images by cropping in post-processing, but to learn how to do the crop with your composition when you're out in the field. We had a pretty lively discussion about the video with most of us having at least one difference of opinion with how Wolf critiqued some of the images.

I absolutely agree with Wolf that composition can help guide the eye through an image. Where I disagree is with his emphasis on left to right. I tend to (not always), compose so that the eye goes from right to left. I do this because it is not the happy path and creates visual tension. In other words it makes for an eye movement that is not the norm for us westerners and therefore makes us sit up and take notice.



So how might this work practically. Below are three images. The first is the original, the second shows the crop box and the third is the cropped version. What do you think? I always like to think of my mind's eye and the camera's eye. My mind's eye is the image I saw when squeezing the shutter and the camera's eye is the actual image. This cropping exercise is an excellent way to synch your mind's eye with the camera's eye. Get down lower, move to different locations, check the light, and compose.






