Early Spring Wildflower Field Trip Report

We had about 15 enthusiastic flower photographers at the field trip to Glacial Heritage on April 27th despite sun and wind-a horrid combination for flower photography. Nonetheless, everyone seemed to find plenty of subjects and adopted some creative means of getting good images of moving flowers. At least there was no shortage of subjects as the open prairie was coming alive with blooms of many species including, Camas, Shooting Stars, Buttercups, Spring Gold, Prairie Violets, Small and Large Flowered Collensia, Orobanche and others that I've forgotten. We found an oak copse with an abundance of Chocolate Lilies and large fields of Shooting Stars as well.

Even the riparian woodland was fairly breezy, creating opportunities to try to depict dancing Fawn Lilies as well as the endemic Small-flowered Trillium and Stream Violets.

We finished by stopping at a large patch of Shooting Stars where we tried to find a way of depicting such richness.

For those interested, the Camas show is about at peak now (May 9th), so there should be good opportunities on Glacial Heritage (open for Prairie Appreciation Day), Mima Mounds and other prairies for broad landscapes this weekend.















Field Trip to Lighthouse Alpaca Ranch

The mascot for this year's Thurston County Fair is "Allie the Alpaca". Cynthia Whelan suggested that in honor of Allie, we go to a local alpaca farm. Since they will shear the alpacas on Memorial Day, we need to rush the planning on this trip. The ranch has agreed to let us come and take photos in the afternoon on May 14th and, if the weather cooperates, in the afternoon on May 25th. I will be leading the visit on May 14th and Cynthia has agreed to lead the visit on May 25th.

Lighthouse Alpaca Ranch is owned by Larry and Sandy Corbin. The ranch is located at 5728 Young Rd. N.W., Olympia WA. The herd itself could get skittish and cause a ruckus so Sandy plans to single out a few alpacas that we would like to photograph and if the alpacas will work with us. Bring a long lens if you want to get some candid photos. Please be aware, we will not be allowed into the field with them. However we will not be charged a fee. As a courtesy, we should be sure to identify the name of the farm in any posting or printing. Sandy uses the wool (they call it fiber) for some hand-crafted items and sells the wool in skeins. S means scavenger hunt, xx is the number of the word and word is the category. For example, an image submitted for the 5th word Plaid would be named S05 RosalindPhilips Plaid.jpg.

Please include a list of your images with descriptions.

Favorite/Best of 2018-19 images. Name your images as Bxx Name ImageName.jpg.

B means Favorite/Best of 2018-19, xx is the number of the image, Name is your name and ImageName is the name of the image. For example the eighth image I submit would be named,

B08_RosalindPhilips_BergyBit.jpg. Please include a self Identification Image as

your 16th image.

NWCCC Workshop The Business of Photography

Ray Pfortner has worked in photography – as an educator, stock photography agent, photo editor, book editor, consultant and photographer – for over 30 years, in New York City, California, and Washington State. He teaches throughout the Pacific Northwest, from colleges including the University of Washington and Bellevue College, both in their Photography Certificate and Youth Programs, to art supply stores, artist leagues and the Seattle Public Library. His teaching focuses on how to design compelling photographs and on the business of art for all mediums, 2D and 3D.

Join Ray Pfortner on Saturday, June 22 for a very full day exploring the business opportunities today and how to make the very most of them. Ray will present some historical perspective on how photographers have managed to survive earlier challenges. We will discuss the keys to doing a photography business, including knowing what you really like to photograph, identifying the consumers for that photography, and strategizing just how to get your work in front of them. We will also discuss the importance of thorough research and wisely established multiple income streams.

Specific topics for the workshop will include:

- 20 practical tips for doing more business with your photography, part-time or full-time.
- Merchandising, including fine art photography through showing and selling partners, brick and mortar and online.
- Licensing, including stock photography.
- Working with non-profits.
- The art of pricing and negotiating.

Go home with a very complete handout with resources ready to take the real steps towards making a return on your investment of time and money in your photography.

Bring three of your photographs that show what you like to photograph on a flash drive to share along with your questions. Ray will rely on your introductions and questions to help shape the discussion, tailoring the workshop specifically to those who join him.







New Member Profile: William (Bill) Ballard

What or who brought you to the club?

I got back into photography after my retirement in 2015. It has been fun traveling around shooting pictures and processing them, but I found after awhile I needed more. I had been thinking of joining a photography group where I could share images and learn, but did not look into it until my wife suggested I check



Olympia for a club. That's how I found the Olympia Camera Club.

How did you get interested in photography?

Starting in my teenage years I enjoyed taking pictures of nature and activities I liked so I could relive those later. I looked at my photography then, and still do today, as shooting memories. After discharge from the Air Force, I thought I'd try photography as a profession. I purchased a Pentex camera and took some lengthy photography courses. My picture taking improved, but I realized I did not have what it took then to be a professional photographer and thus moved on into a career in Insurance where I traveled extensively. Taking pictures was part of my job. I tried at first to use great equipment and took along multiple lenses, but the gear was too heavy and I could get by with point and shoot camera results. So for years, photography, as a serious hobby, was on the back burner.

What kind of photography do you like to do?

Travel and landscape are my favorite types of photography today mainly because of wonderful trips my wife and I have taken over the past several years. With each trip or local field trip, I find my photos are getting better. That has really intensified after joining the Olympia Camera Club and taking photography courses on line. I must say that because of the club, I'm getting interested in shooting birds; I just need to learn their names.

What equipment is in your camera bag?

Years ago I had great Nikon film cameras and many lenses. Because of the combined weight, I left the gear at home a lot and used a point and shoot. Now I use light weight mirrorless cameras and lenses. I have 3 Panasonic Lumix cameras: GX85, GX8 and a G9 (my main camera). Also, I just purchased a Sony A6300. The lenses for the Lumix cameras are: 45-150mm, 14-140mm, 12-60mm, F1.7 20mm, and a 100-300mm; my go to is the 14-140. Lens range doubles with the Lumix crop factor of 2. For the Sony I have a Sigma F1.4, 30mm and Sigma 100-400mm. With a crop factor of 1.5, I have a great 600mm lens. I can haul two Lumix cameras and all their

lenses in a lightweight backpack. No more point and shoot.

What post processing programs do you use?

Post processing with me has evolved over the years. I started with Photoshop Elements. But, my go to program now is ON1 Raw; Elements 2018 is a plug in. For HDR I use Photomatix Pro 6 and Aurora 2019. PhotoTangler is my collage maker and Topaz is used for denoise.

What do you want to learn from the club?

The main reason for joining the club was to learn more about photography and thus be a better photographer. Since joining, I have already learned a great deal from the many programs offered and member's photos. To conclude, I'm very glad I found Olympia Camera Club; it has exceeded my expectations.



Member Profile: Eldon Estep

What or who brought you to the club?

We were planning a trip to Alaska, so I purchased a new camera to document the trip. I was looking for ways to improve my skills and, having enjoyed and learned a lot from being a long-time member of a computer user group, decided to look around for a camera club. I live about half way between Tacoma and Olympia so could go either way but I think the quality of the



club's website drew me for a first visit to the Olympia

Camera Club where I was welcomed and observed an active, knowledgeable, interesting group of people.

How did you get involved in Photography?

I think my interest in photography was first sparked by viewing images through a View-Master Stereoscope when I was probably five or six years old.



I don't remember my first camera but the one that started me thinking about more than capturing a moment was with a Brownie Hawkeye. I was probably 13 or 14 years old and my father and I were on a camping trip around the Olympic Peninsula. We stopped at a pullout along Lake Crescent and there was an old driftwood log on the beach with a projection that pointed out toward the lake. I just knew that, with the log in the foreground, it would make a good photo (B&W) and it did. (If the photo survived, I haven't found it.) Since then, I've taken many photos but with little effort to create quality images other than to be conscious of composition.



What kind of photography do you like to do?

I like to go to the Billy Frank Jr. Nisqually Wildlife Refuge in the morning and photograph the wildlife I see as I walk along the boardwalks. Family activities are fun to

document, and landscape and architecture are interesting subjects.

What equipment is in your camera bag?

A Sony A6000 with two kit lenses, an 18-55mm f/3.5-5.6 and a 55-210mm f/4.5-6.3 and a Sony FE 70-300mm f/4.5-5.6. I also purchased an adapter so I can experiment with two old Super-Takumar lenses, a 50mm f/1.4 and a 150mm f/1.4.

What post processing programs do you use?

About two years ago, I switched to a Windows laptop from an Apple MacBook Pro (we still have an iMac) where I was using the Apple Photos Application. A year or so ago, I subscribed to the Adobe Creative Cloud Photography plan and started using Adobe Lightroom. I just started an Adobe Photoshop course on Lynda.com through the library.

What do you want to learn from the club?

I want to improve my skills and stay motivated to practice and be ready to capture a good scene or activity and create an image that I like which I can share on Flickr and SmugMug.

"I'm just taking a photograph." Many photographers brag that they would do whatever is 'necessary' to get the shot. But taking risks, trespassing, going beyond the boundaries, being rude, or just walking into a closed area is not good for anyone or anything.

As a photographer, ask yourself, "At what cost?"

Some of the Earth's greatest landscapes and treasured natural areas are threatened by increased visitation and general lack of care.

Don't allow your photography become a liability for the beautiful environments that we all cherish and photograph.

Nature First https://www.naturefirstphotography.org is an organization built on seven core principles that help communicate how each of us can enjoy nature photography responsibly. The Seven Principles of Nature First Photography were developed to help educate and guide both professional and recreational photographers in sustainable, minimal impact practices that will help preserve nature's beautiful locations.

THE NATURE FIRST PRINCIPLES

- 1. Prioritize the well-being of nature over photography.
- 2. Educate yourself about the places you photograph.
- 3. Reflect on the possible impact of your actions.
- 4. Use discretion if sharing locations.
- 5. Know and follow rules and regulations.
- 6. Always follow Leave No Trace principles and strive to leave places better than you found them.

Actively promote and educate others about these principles









Review Agenda


Meredith Rafferty reviewed the agenda and it was accepted.


