Field Trip September 22, 2018 Aspen Farms, Yelm

Mark your calendars for Saturday September 22 when we'll travel to the Aspen Farms Eventing Center in Yelm for the Cross Country and Jumping Horse Trials. "Eventing" is when horses with riders go through courses with water hazards and all kinds of interesting jumps. The cross country is the most "open" event with field and forest backgrounds, natural jumps like fallen logs and ponds and plenty of room to put up a camera. Cross country horses and riders start across the course individually at staggered times (i.e. perhaps 10 minutes apart.) While at Aspen Farms we may also expect to photograph people and horses that are not moving. There will be professional photographers present as well. If you think you might want to publish any of your natural light portraits be sure to bring along releases. Admission and parking for spectators is free. Learn more and view some photos at Aspenfarmseventing.com. Thanks to Dennis Plank and his wife, Michelle, for the tip about this exciting opportunity.

When photographing "eventing" we need to agree to follow these rules:

- 1. Never cross a barrier. This is usually a fence at the ring events and a white tape, waist height, on the cross country course.
- 2. Horses have right of way in all cases.
- 3. If you hear, "Horse on course" or a whistle or bell, don't use the 'cross walk' (areas where you can cross to get to another part of the course) until the horse has

passed you.

4. All dogs must be on a leash. Better yet, leave all but service dogs at home.

For members living in Olympia and Lacey, we'll gather to car pool on the far side of the Martin Way Park and Ride in Lacey at 7:45am on September 22. Persons living in Tumwater and South may chose to travel together via an alternative, more efficient route and instead meet us at Aspen Farms at 8:30am.

This event occurs all day long. Bring your lunch and plenty of water. Wear walking/hiking shoes or boots that could get muddy and be prepared for any kind of weather.

NWCCC Competitions

This is a reminder that the Northwest Council of Camera Clubs (NWCCC) offers several individual competitions to members of clubs within the Council. Coming up are the print, digital and slideshow competitions during the November 10 conference in Everett.

If you've entered prints for the Thurston County Fair or you just like making prints, you already have images ready for the "Open Print Salon". The rules for this year's print competition are posted at NWCCC's website, www.nwcameraclubs.org/competitions along with the entry form. Basically, you may enter 3 color and 3 monochromes in either the large print or small print category but not both. The large print size must be at least 8" x 10" and no larger than 16" x 20" including the mount. Small prints may be no larger than 8" x 10" but the mount may be as large as 11" x 14". There is no minimum size limit on the small prints. Bring your prints to the OCC General Membership Meeting September 25 and we will deliver them to NWCCC for you or follow the directions listed in the rules. Remember the deadline

is midnight October 1. Please visit the website for the entry form and specific rules.

And if you have a digital camera, your images are in a digital format somewhere on your computer. If that is the case, you are nearly ready to enter the NWCCC "Open Digital Salon" competition. You may submit the same image as a print and as digital, they are separate competitions. You can submit as many as four images, the subject is open: color, monochrome, and creative/altered reality; all are acceptable. Images must be jpeg, not to exceed 1920 pixels wide and 1080 pixels high. File size should be limited to 1000 kb in SRGB color space. Deadline for entries is midnight October 1. Please see the above mentioned web site for specific instructions, mailing address and entry forms. It is better for you to submit your images but if you bring them on a portable device, we will see they are delivered.

The Council also conducts a "Digital Slide Show" competition with slide show presentations not to exceed four minutes. Please visit the aforementioned website for details and please enter.

Milky Way from Haleakala

Milky Way: SINGLE, ISO6400, 11mm, f/2.8, 30 seconds CAMERA: Nikon D750 using a Tokina 11-14 mm lens DATE: 08/11/2018

What a great night of photography. Going from 85 degrees and driving up to the summit at 10,023 feet and it gets colder...brrr. One of the main things I wanted to do while we were in Maui was go up to Haleakala and hoped that it would be a clear night to finally get some shoots of the Milky Way. The first time I had gone up it was foggy and raining a few years ago. We arrived on a Wednesday and I went up that night but the Milky Way didn't come out very good. I was able to go back up after Hurricane Hector strolled by and got the moisture out of the air and WOW!!!!

What a difference, it really brightened up the Milky Way. I've never seen it so bright. It was so clear, I even got Venus, Jupiter (in the middle, I think) and Saturn in there somewhere!

Also, if you look really close you can see the laser from the observatory which is the "TLRS-4 at HO which is to maintain the time-series of satellite laser ranging (SLR) data produced by LURE, an earlier generation laser ranging experiment on Haleakala."



Fall Photography

Fall is here! I can smell it in the air, the nights are cool, and the days are getting shorter. When I think of fall photography, I think of two things, leaves and water. I love the juxtaposition of leaves and water and who doesn't love a landscape of red and yellow leaves.

One of my favorite places to photograph in the fall is along the Dosewallips road (FR 2610) on Hood Canal. The Dosewallips River runs alongside the road and there are numerous streams that spill down onto the road. The road is washed out, but you can drive a fair distance

along it before the barri-

er.

My preference is for a cloudy day. I don't even mind a little rain. Rain along with a polarizer or a fall enhancing filter really makes the colors



pop. What else do I bring with me? A tripod, a 3-stop neutral density filter, a remote release, and micro fiber

cloths to wipe any moisture off the camera. I usually use my 70-200 mm lens but always bring a wide angle as well. I like the 70-200 because it allows me to isolate the scene and



really focus on the details.

I am looking for specific types of scenes for my fall photography. I am interested in reflections, color around and in water. I particularly like to frame waterfalls with colored leaves. I like to change my perspective and often lie on the ground shooting upwards. I pay attention to the

color wheel and try to include complementary colors in the composition. For example, orange leaves against a blue sky. Autumn color is also great for blur photography and for finding interesting patterns and textures.



Don't forget that fall is a wonderful time for mushrooms. Look down to find these beauties.

Fall is a wonderful time for photography. Take those sweeping landscapes, but also take time to look for scenes within the scene.


New Member Profile: Dan Tufford

What or who brought you to the club?

My wife and I moved to Lacey in early 2017 as a retirement move. I wanted to ramp up my photography interest and activity so searched for the club and joined, more on this later.

How did you get interested in photography?

My interest goes back to early high school. My Dad had




I also did a short stint as sports photographer for the local newspaper, shooting high school football and swimming events. I must not have been very memorable because my editor, also one of my best friends at the time, no longer recalls that I worked there. Oh well...it was for only one year and my involvement was fairly minor. The combined effect of moving away from my darkroom after high school and starting a career after college was that my active photography diminished to snapshots during vacations and other things of interest. However, for the last 20 years or so I always carried a small camera (later my cell phone) with me during field work as part of my research career to document my work. I also began taking pictures of other things that interested me, more on that next. Finally with retirement I decided to feed my photography interest more vigorously.

What kind of photography do you like to do?

My interest includes a broad spectrum of subjects. My wife and I are campers and birders so we spend a lot of time in out-of-the-way places. I like nature photography including landscapes and flora/fauna. Patterns, color, and texture (both real and visual only) often draws my attention. I have a particular interest in wildflowers. I saw a quote from Iris Murdoch that inspired me to create a photo album on my Facebook site called "A Planet Without Flowers" (see below). I populate it with images of the wildflowers I see.

My interest is not only the natural world. Patterns, color, and texture inspires me no matter where I see it. And of course I still take snapshots of vacations and other things my wife and I do.

I do not consider any of my photography to be "professional grade" nor do I necessarily aspire to that



What equipment is in your camera bag?

After retiring I knew I wanted a better camera than my cell phone but did not know what to get among the myriad of options. I knew I did not want to be carrying around 20 pounds of camera equipment but that was about it. A good friend of mine is a professional photographer who knows the kind of things I am interested in. She recommended the Sony RX10 IV which I subsequently bought. So far the only other thing is a UV haze filter and I already had a tripod. As I learn more about how to use the camera to get the images I want I expect to get more equipment.

What post processing programs do you use?

So far all my image files are jpg so I guess the camera does most of the postprocessing. I have used photo editing software such as Corel Photopaint (because I had access to it at work) but I have never done anything very complex. I expect to do more of this in the future using raw files. However, I am mostly interested in true representations of what I see rather than visual changes. So I think my needs for post processing are somewhat more modest than for some photographers.

What do you want to learn from the club?

There is so much for me to learn about the art, science, and engineering of photography and methods for getting the images I want. Also I am still learning how to use my camera, which is much more complex than anything I have used in the past. The few OCC meetings I have been able to attend were treasure troves of good information and I hope to learn more over time. I am unable to attend all the meetings I would like to simply because of schedule conflicts. I also hope to be able contribute to the OCC one day rather than simply absorb from other people.




Member Profile: Gene Eckhardt






