In 1940 the Olympia Camera Club did believe in something! It is called the Northwest Council of Camera Clubs (NWCCC.) The idea of the Council originated with the Olympia Camera Club as an outgrowth of its annual regional exhibit, the Olympia Salon of Photography. Now, after 67 years of existence, and service to the Northwest region, it is rapidly on the decline. I urge you to take up volunteerism and help us keep this institution going. After all, we are a proud member of this 18 club organization. I am making a commitment and asking, as your OCC President, to volunteer and help us revitalize the Northwest Council. I am hoping that other clubs within the council are making the same types of commitments.

Now, a few of you (okay a lot of you) may be asking what is the NWCCC and what does it do? Created in 1941, the council is a non-profit organization that is supposed to be the connection of camera clubs located in Pacific Northwest. It is a federation of camera clubs, not individuals, with membership limited to the Pacific Northwest. The NWCCC promotes the advancement of photography as a science, recreation, art, and to encourage social networking between all persons interested in photography. Primarily, it strives to improve camera club programs, to raise the standard of accomplishment by camera club members, and to keep the clubs in this area informed of the activities of neighboring groups.

How can you help? Volunteer! Promote the Council and your own Camera Club! Be an active member! Every year the council puts on a conference and typically the Olympia Camera Club has the biggest member attendance. We cheer when our members do well in the competitions (should have heard us at the last conference in Gresham, Oregon!) This year, the Olympia Camera Club is trying to host the conference in our own backyard and we need your help! Wes and Cornelia Kirkpatrick, our NWCCC delegates, are leading the way in making this happen. Not only do we need volunteers to lead field trips, man the registration tables, help with the planning and logistics, and many other tasks. We need volunteers to be a part of the council and their day to day activities.

Olympia Camera Club Board Minutes

Meeting called to order by President Dave Simmerman at 6:10 p.m.

Present were: President Dave Simmerman, Vice President Allen Raphael, Treasurer Shauna Kearns, Secretary Chris Weinreich, Wes Kirkpatrick, Frank & Terri Townsend, Terry & Bonnie Liberty John West and Joani Easterlund

The October minutes were approved as they appeared in the newsletter.

Treasurer's report: The report was compiled by Robert Kletsch and was read by Shauna. This was the last financial report from Robert Kletsch who had been the club's treasurer since 1982. The October beginning balance in the checking account was \$757.47. The club received \$101 in dues and \$11.25 from the coffee fund. Expenses were \$29.26 for mailing the traveing prints and \$11.99 for the web site. The ending balance was \$828.47. The savings account had an ending balance of \$1346.46

November general meeting: Allen said that John Davis will be the speaker. December will be the Christmas gathering.

Trips: November 17. Frank will lead a trip to Julia Butler Hansen National Wildlife Refuge (just east of Skamo-kawa on the lower Columba River). The refuge is known for its a large number of deer. The trip starts from the Panda Express parking lot, Tumwater, at 7 a.m.

January. On the first weekend, Cornelia Kirkpatrick will lead a trip to the Skagit Valley to photo the eagles. Allen will check on river rafting as part of the trip.

September: Wes Kirkpatrick wants to know how many people are interested in the hot air balloon gathering in Prosser. If enough people are, he can reserve a block of rooms.

Digital Group: John said the group has out grown its meeting place at Apple Park Apartments. Dave said there is space at Capital High School in Pod A (the same place as the general membership meeting) but it will cost \$25 per meeting. Chris moved and Frank seconded to move the meeting space to Capital High School. Discussion followed centered on the money issue. The motion was passed.

Newsletter: Wes reminded people that he needs newsletter articles by Friday (Nov. 9).

Northwest Council of Camera Clubs: In January, the Council board will be decide the future of the organization, and the board wanted club input on the three options that have been proposed:

- 1. Continue as is;
- 2. Par down activities to just the web site, traveling show and the newsletter; 3. Fold up and die. The three options were discussed but no conclusion was reached, except that no one wanted the Council to die.

Yearbook: The Yearbook meeting has been moved back to Jan. 19th because of the proposed eagle photo trip to Skagit Valley on the first weekend in January.

Meeting adjourned at 7:30

CARL COOK PASSES

A number of years ago, before I was in the Olympia Camera Club, I used to hang out at Don's Camera trying to learn all I could about taking better photographs. I couldn't help admiring the nature shots on the wall behind the counter. When I asked about them, I learned they were taken by a local photographer named Carl Cook. A couple years later I was in the club and volunteering at our county fair and learned the most outgoing of the three judges that day was indeed Carl Cook. Carl judged a couple more fairs, and at the last one it was obvious he had been ill. The following year he was in the hospital at fair time and couldn't make it. I stopped by to visit with him and got to know him a little better. He was unable to judge again this year.

Carl passed away, November 6 after fighting the cancer for several years. He never joined our club but remained a friend to us to the end. He would stop by now and then to see what we were doing, and though to ill to judge he would show up at the fair to see how we, and the local entrants, were doing.

I haven't lived in Olympia all that long so I didn't know Carl had been a disc jockey on KGY for a number of years until He and Dick Cunningham were speaking of it a couple of years ago. Carl was invited to broadcast this year on the stations anniversary, and I'm told they played that hour this Wednesday in his honor. He had that voice!

Carl was a great nature photographer. I remember a member bringing a magazine featuring some of Carl's work and I spent the next couple of weeks trying to get my own copy. He had this thing with crows, building a whole portfolio of crow photographs. One year he graced the fair with one. The idea of a collection on a single subject has inspired me to look for the same sort of effort.

I'll miss Carl and I know the Club will as well. There aren't enough artists in the world it is a shame to lose another.

PSA is a worldwide interactive organization for anyone interested in photography, be they casual, serious amateurs or professional photographers. Individual members are offered a wide variety of activities: a monthly magazine, photo and digital competitions, study groups via mail and the internet, how-to programs, an annual conference and a raft of other activities and services.

The Photographic Society of America was founded in 1934 to "Promote the Arts and Sciences of Photography and to further public education therein". There are members in all 50 states as well as 60 other countries of the world. PSA Headquarters are located in Oklahoma City, OK. Interested in becoming a PSA member?

All that is required is an interest in photography, at any level, from beginner to internationally recognized artist or skilled professional. There are programs for everyone and there are no restrictions based on age, skill, sex, race, business, or profession. The member's photography may be a hobby, avocation, full-time vocation or even just an intense interest in finding a new and lasting recreational activity.

A key to participation in PSA is the **PSA Journal**, the oldest consumer photographic magazine published in the United States. Every issue of the *Journal* includes articles with examples of outstanding photography, "how to" information, data on the latest equipment, book reviews, and news about PSA members and their activities and accomplishments.

The seven PSA Divisions (Pictorial Print, Color Projected Image, Nature, Photo Travel, Photojournalism, Electronic Imaging, Stereo) offer more than one hundred specific services and activities. These include courses in photography, technical information services; instructional slide sets, DVDs and videos; critique and evaluation services; group workshops; national, regional and local photo seminars; print, slide, digital essay competitions and more.

Dues are as low as \$45 per year.

Bald Eagle Weekend Shoot with overnight stay at Clark's Skagit River Resort Rockport, WA (Hwy 20 North Cascades Hwy) (170 miles one way, let's carpool)

This is a repeat outing for the club; the recent trip last January was superb with sunny skies, eagles and freezing temperatures. Rain or shine the trip will be an adventure. As a group, reserving three or more accommodation units (through one contact – Cornelia) we can receive a 10% group discount. The cozy country cabins and triplex units hold from two to six people, mostly four people with costs ranging from \$69-89.00 (+tax) for a couple and \$9.00 for additional roommates, per night. There is a tasty restaurant with yummy breakfasts located at the resort and other food options are possible with planning.

Eagles feed along the river in the early morning. On cloudy, rainy days, in late morning and early afternoon, eagles roost along the river. while on sunny days they soar over the valley.

Picture taking: Most of the viewing sites face the south, so on sunny days the sun shines into the camera lens.

The Skagit River Bald Eagle Interpretive Center is located in Rockport, WA

Four good places, staffed with volunteer guides with telescopes, to begin your eagle watching adventure are:

- Skagit River Bald Eagle Interpretive Center
- Mile Post 100 Rest Area on Highway 20
- Howard Miller Steelhead County Park
- Marblemount Fish Hatchery

Why do the eagles gather on the upper Skagit River?

The majority of the Upper Skagit watershed bald eagle population is seasonal. In the winter, large numbers migrate from as far away as Alaska to eat the dead salmon carcasses that abound in the Skagit River and its tributaries. The best eagle watching season is from late November to late-January with eagle numbers peaking from Christmas through the second week of January - about two weeks after the peak of salmon spawning (and dying). 

Announcing the Year 2007 OCC Annual!

Every year, OCC members get together to assemble a permanent collection of their recent photographic work. We do this by publishing our *Annual*, a booklet to which we all contribute our photographs. There is a copy of the *Annual* published for each contributor so each person gets a copy to keep. We have found these books to be excellent keepsakes and inspirations. We assemble the book at a gathering at Terry and Bonnie Liberty's home, accompanied by a "finger food" lunch. We would encourage everyone to get involved in this enjoyable activity. It provides a good deal of fun, a collection of your colleagues' work and a look at where we all were, photographically in 2007 The details are as follows:

The Annual

Each *Annual* is made up of one image from each participating OCC member or former member. Participation is voluntary, of course. It's nice but not required that the images were created during 2007 Images may be created by any photo process, film and/or digital, and may be any size from a snapshot to a maximum of 8 ½ x11 inches. Each participant provides one print per book so if there are ten participants, there will be ten books, each with one print from each participant.

Publishing Party

The publishing party will be on January 19th Noon, at Terry and Bonnie's home, 8741 Stoney Creek Lane SW. This is **party time!** providing us with a "finger food" lunch and an excellent opportunity to become acquainted with other members. In the event you are unable to attend, you may deliver your prints to the Liberty's or send them with another member. Please provide the name of the person who will be present to assemble your *Annual* for you.

Note: Because we permanently bind the *Annual*, all books must be assembled at the party. It is difficult to add or exchange images with those already included in the binder, so a fully completed *Annual* is our goal! Please assure that your prints are at the Liberty's, ready for assembly on the party date.

The Prints

OPTION 1: PRINTS MOUNTED ON PAPER PAGES

Photos can be mounted on 8 ½ x 11 pages with titles, etc. The preferred paper is 24 pound bond or similar. Please create your own pages and mount your prints, ready to bind before the party. You may use materials, colors etc. of your choice. In that way you can control the placement of the print and information you want included on your page. When mounting, allow a ½ to ¾ inch extra margin along the left hand (long) edge of the page for binding.

OPTION 2: PRINTS DONE DIRECTLY ON 8 ½ X 11 PHOTO PAPER

You can bring prints that are done directly on $8\frac{1}{2} \times 11$ photo paper. We will bind these into the books with no need for other materials. When printing, allow a $\frac{1}{2}$ to $\frac{3}{4}$ inch extra margin along the left hand (long) edge of the page for binding.

Let's Party!

So everyone decide if you'd like to participate and if so, what print you want to contribute. If you wish to participate, sign up on or before the OCC Christmas party on December 17th. After the 17th, print and mount the required number of images, make up some "finger foods" for a potluck and come to the party!!

Directions Via Highway 101 and Mud Bay Road

Here are directions to Terry and Bonnie's house.

Go South on I5 to Olympia the exit on highway 101.

Take the exit and head West on 101.

You'll pass exits to Cooper Point Rd. and Black Lake Blvd.

Keep going West on 101.

Get off 101 on the Mud Bay Rd. exit.

Bear right until you come to a stop sign the bottom of the exit at the fire station on Mud Bay Rd.

Turn left on Mud Bay Rd. and cross under the freeway.

Shortly after the underpass is Delphi Rd.

Turn left on Delphi.

Follow Delphi for about six miles.

Eventually (about 6 miles) you will come to the intersection with Waddell Creek Rd on your right.

At the intersection, stay on Delphi (left) for another 1/4 mile or so.

As you enter a long left curve, you'll find a white-on-green sign for 8741 and a street sign "Stoney Creek Lane" on your right.

Turn right at the sign, pass the mailboxes on your right and follow the paved driveway.

At the next 8741 sign, turn right and go to the top of the hill to a cul-de-sac.

Drive straight through the cul-de-sac (sign says 8741) and you're there.

Alternate Directions Via Black Lake Road at Highway 101

Get on Black Lake Road going South from the Hwy 101 overpass.

Follow Black Lake Road past the lake and continue on it until you get to Delphi Rd.

Turn left (South) on Delphi.

Follow Delphi for about two miles.

You will come to the intersection with Waddell Creek Rd on your right.

At the intersection, stay on Delphi (left) for another 1/4 mile or so.
