**Calendar:**

Colleen again reminded group leaders to post happenings on the Club Calendar by the first of each month.

**General Meeting:**

The general meeting will occur on April 28<sup>rd</sup> in Pod A of Capital High School at 6:30 pm. This month's featured speaker is Gary Ouellette, a Meadow Rover Volunteer at Mt. Rainier National Park. He will share his photos and talk about volunteering in the Park. Patrick Dixon, a retired Alaska fisherman and poet, as well as a

former photography instructor will present at the May 28th General Meeting.

**Advanced Group:** Because of the failing health of our photographer friend, Al Balch, who lives at EdgeLake Mobile Home Park, it has become necessary to seek a new location for the Advanced Group Meetings. Members are urged to pay particular attention to the new location listed in this month's Advanced meeting e-mail announcement. Scott Wood reported that both the April 21<sup>st</sup> and May 19<sup>th</sup> meetings will focus on work flows using Lightroom 5 and/or 6, if the latter is released soon as promised.

**Fundamentals Group:** The April 14<sup>th</sup> Fundamentals Group, which occurs at 6:30 pm in Pod A of Capital High School, will continue discussing the catalog features of Lightroom. The May 12<sup>th</sup> meeting will focus on landscape photography.

**Webmaster:** Colleen Easley reported that a major overhaul was made to the Member Gallery Section of our website. Flickr links for the 48 OCC members who post on Flickr are now listed. Because April marked the second quarter of the year OCC dues have been prorated on the Membership page to \$15 for an individual.

**Social Programs/Field Trips:** Frank Townsend reported that the field trip Committee met March 4th. Four field trips were planned, beginning with a trip to ZaZu's House, a Parrot Sanctuary in Woodinville on April 18th. Frank reported that afterward members may choose to visit the Chateau Ste. Michelle Winery or Dixon Farms. Other trips include Westport and Bottle Beach for early May, The Rose and Japanese Gardens at Portland's Washington Park on May 30<sup>th</sup>, plus an overnight to Forks to visit the Hoh River Rain Forest and Ocean Beaches on June 27<sup>th</sup>.

**The Scavenger Hunt/Dinner:** will be held at River's Edge Restaurant on June 23<sup>rd</sup>. Rosalind Philips and Linda Foss are working on the word list.

**Membership:** John Damitio reported that Neal Harris and Bruce Campbell joined since the last Board Mtg.

Besides jurying the traveling print finalists these meetings attempted to restructure the NWCCC, which presently has no leadership. **Thurston Co. Fair:** Frank Townsend said the Fair Superintendents will meet this month.

#### **Old Business:**

1. Those present agreed that the Casa Mia is a preferable location for our monthly Board Mtg. Colleen Easley will see if this restaurant can continue to accommodate our group in the evening of the first Tuesday of every month.

2. Gary Wells has made arrangements for 3 photographers from OCC to do a Help Portrait type shoot for the STARS Program participants and their families at Senior Services in Lacey on June 20<sup>th</sup>. We will provide edited final images which the sponsoring agency will burn onto CDs or make into prints for distribution to the subjects. Set up for this event will start at 9:30 am. The shoot will be over by 4:30.

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## **Zazu's House Parrot Sanctuary**

On Saturday, April 18<sup>th</sup> we will travel to Woodinville to visit Zazu's House Parrot Sanctuary for an opportunity to photograph some brightly colored birds. When we've taken all the shots we can, we will journey a little further on to the Chateau Ste. Michelle winery where we can walk about the gardens, take the public tour and maybe taste a little wine.

Zazu's mission is to simply provide a safe and interesting environment for all birds who find their way to the sanctuary. They provide a new world for birds, offering plenty of free flight opportunities, social interaction with other birds and plenty of loving attention.

Built on the 1912 estate owned by Seattle lumber baron Frederick Stimson, Chateau Ste. Michelle's roots date back to the Repeal of Prohibition. In 1967 under legendary winemaker Andre Tchelistcheff, a new line of premium vinifera wines was introduced called Ste. Michelle Vintners. In 1976, Ste. Michelle Vintners built a French style winery Chateau in Woodinville, and changed its name to Chateau Ste. Michelle.

We will leave the Martin Way Park and Ride just off I-5 near the Regal Cinema at 9 AM on April 18<sup>th</sup> for the drive to Zazu's in Woodinville. There should be opportunities to shoot indoors and out and I suggest bringing either a variable zoom lens or a variety of prime. It is always a good idea to have a tripod or monopod on hand for any situation. I recommend you bring along snacks and drinks.

Zazu's is a non-profit organization run by volunteers. In the past our club has shown great generosity to speakers and projects, and it is my hope this practice will continue with donations to the sanctuary. The Chateau is very protective of their brand and concerned that images identifying the winery will show up in advertising. They have been assured that this is a fun outing on our part and that our photographs are not intended for professional purposes. It is possible that we may have to sign statements to that effect but I've been assured we will be permitted to shoot.

**Fundamentals Meeting**  
**April 14, 2015 @ 6:30 p.m.**

This month, the presentation will be a continuation of “The Ten Do’s of the Lightroom 5 Catalog”

Last month we had a lively discussion on catalogs and did not get to Travel catalogs. This month we will start with Travel Catalogs and move on to some other tips for catalog and library sanity. Please note that “Ask Tim Grey” column this month focuses on how to move files from one drive to another without messing up your Lightroom catalog. Please feel free to email me ([fundamentals@olympiacameraclub.org](mailto:fundamentals@olympiacameraclub.org)) your own catalog/library mishap and I will incorporate it into the presentation. We will also briefly discuss how to photograph birds in captivity in preparation for our April 18 field trip to Zazu’s Parrot House Rescue

The May Presentation will be on “Using Flickr to Participate in OCC Flickr Sites” and on “The Photographer’s Ephemeris.” Colleen Easley will teach us how to use Flickr to participate in OCC Flickr sites. Colleen has made some changes to the OCC website, and this is an update to teach how to use the changed functionality successfully.

The Photographer’s Ephemeris (TPE) is a website and smart phone app will revolutionize the way you take photographs by allowing more accurate predictions on light quality and direction at your chosen location. I have been using TPE for the last year to predict light, and although I have not always been satisfied with the results, the lighting has been what TPE led me believe it should be. So please join me on April 14 to explore using your computer and smart phone as part of your research in setting up your photographs.

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**Advanced Photography Group**  
**April 21, 2015 @ 6:30 p.m.**

The April get together of the Advanced Photography Group is going to be all about Lightroom. As of right now the plan is to cover a Lightroom workflow from import to publish. Using the Library, Map and Develop modules we will take an image from the camera, process it and then publish it to the web. We will also cover the Print Module and how you use things like printer profiles to soft proof images. The Fundamentals group has been looking at the Lightroom catalog over the last couple months, and while we will address a little of what they have been covering, we will be going a lot deeper into things like image cataloging, keywording, raw processing and optimizing for your final output. If you have a laptop with Lightroom installed please bring it along.

With all of that said, there is one thing that may change our agenda for the April meeting. Adobe is rumored to be releasing version 6 of Lightroom soon. If they do release before the Advanced group meeting, and there is enough time, we will be taking a look at the new Lightroom 6 and seeing how it differs from the current Lightroom 5. If this does happen, we will simply shift the workflow program to the May meeting.

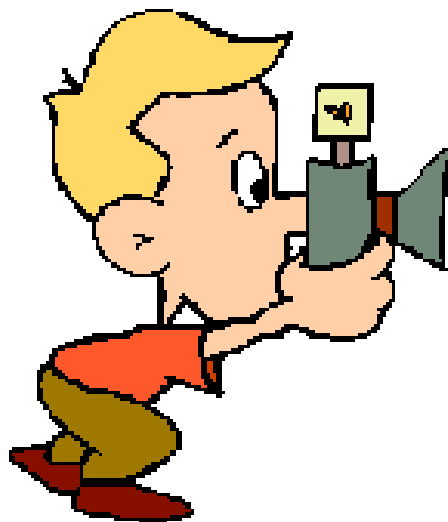

## The City of Roses

One of Portland's nicknames is the City of Roses, and this town has long been an incubator for the scented beauties. Nearly a century ago, a farsighted citizen convinced the local government to set up a rose test garden during World War I to preserve the species of European roses that might be decimated by the bombings. Thus, in 1917, the [International Rose Test Garden](#) was born, and lives on as the oldest official, continuously operated public rose test garden in the United States. What does that mean for you? If you visit from April through October you can walk among 7,000 luscious rose bushes. While June is when they're most bountiful we will visit on May 30<sup>th</sup> (pretty close). The garden is free, open from 7:30 a.m. to 9 p.m. daily, and might be a good place to ask someone to marry you.

While in Portland we may also have time to visit the [Lan Su Chinese Garden](#), smack dab in the middle of downtown. Because of its location parking may be tough but if we can get in we are certain to be rewarded with fantastic photo ops, and sip a little tea. Admission to Lan Su is \$9.50 unless you've reached the magical age of 62, those prices are \$8.50. We may also choose to visit the Portland Japanese Garden, admission there is also \$9.50 but if you are 65 and over it is a mere \$7.75.

We will leave from the 5 Guys Burgers parking lot (not too close to the business please) at 7:30 AM on Saturday May 30<sup>th</sup>. We really need to car pool on this trip as parking may be difficult. As always bring drinks and snacks, and you may want to bring a camera. Tripods are allowed in the Rose Garden but I'm not certain of the other venues.

This year, members will have two ways to participate in Banquet Slide Show entertainment.

Submit one image for each of the 15 words below. You may take as many images as you like and do as much processing as you like, but you can only submit one image for each word. Please note that some of the words are from the 52-week challenge list. You may submit images that you have already posted for the challenge.

### OR

Submit 10-15 of your favorite/best images taken between 6/1/2014 and 6/9/2015. You may do as much processing as you like on the images.

### RULES

1. All images must be JPEGs – no RAW or TIFF images.
2. The images must not exceed 1024 pixels in width or 768 pixels in height.
3. The resolution should not exceed 72 dpi.
4. Scavenger Hunt Images. Name your images as Sxx\_Name\_word.jpg where
5. S means scavenger hunt, xx is the number of the word and word is the category. For example, an image submitted for the 5<sup>th</sup> word of Blue would be named S05\_RosalindPhilips\_Blue.jpg.
6. Please include a list of your images with descriptions.
7. Favorite/Best of 2014-15 images. Name your images as Bxx\_Name\_ImageName.jpg .
8. B means Favorite/Best of 2014, xx is the number of the image, Name is your name and ImageName is the name of the image. For example the eighth image I submit would be named, B08\_RosalindPhilips\_BergyBit.jpg.
9. Please include a self Identification Image.
10. Please include a list of your images with descriptions.
11. Please burn your images to a CD or DVD.

## Ask Tim Grey

I have been using Lightroom on my MacBook Air, which has very little storage. I would like to move all the photos to an external drive and delete them from the MacBook for more space. How can this be done?

### Tim's Answer:

There are, of course, several approaches you could take to move your photos from one drive to another. My preference is to take an approach that ensures there is no risk of Lightroom losing track of your photos. Therefore, I prefer to move the photos from directly in Lightroom.

The first step is to make sure all of your photos are already backed up to a separate hard drive, to ensure you have a way to recover your photos in case something goes wrong during the process of moving photos.

Once you have a backup for your photos, you can connect the external hard drive you want to use as the new location for your photos. This drive will not appear in Lightroom because no photos on the drive are currently being managed by Lightroom. However, you can create a new folder on the drive so that the drive will be shown in Lightroom. To do so click the "plus" icon to the right of the Folders header on the left panel in the Library module in Lightroom, and choose "Add Folder" from the popup menu.

In the dialog that appears, navigate to the hard drive you want to use for photo storage, and click the New Folder button at the bottom-left of the dialog. Type a name for a "master" folder to contain all of your photos, such as "Photos", press Enter/Return to create the new folder, and click the Choose button to add that folder as an available location in the Folders section on the left panel.

At this point you can select all of the folders in the Folders section of the left panel. To do so, click on the first folder on the list and then hold the Shift key and click the last folder on the list. You can then point to any of the selected folders and drag-and-drop to move all folders to the new destination (the folder you created on the external drive). Note that Lightroom will ask you to confirm you want to actually move the photos on the hard drive.

Once the files have been moved, you will have all of your existing folders (and all of the photos within those folders) reflected in the folder structure on your external hard drive, under the new folder you created on that drive. If you prefer to see only the photos containing your photos and not the "parent" folder you created, you can right-click on the parent folder and choose "Hide This Parent" from the popup menu that appears. At any time you can reveal that parent folder again by right-clicking on any of the folders within that parent and choosing "Show Parent Folder" from the popup menu.

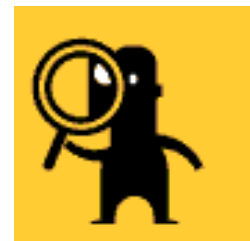
