In addition to traveling prints the Council sponsors an Open Print Salon, an Open Digital Salon and Rix Showcase competition.

## JOURNEY THROUGH THE GORGE

Get ready to spend the weekend of April 30 and May 1 touring the Columbia River Gorge, but this time waterfalls are not the main reason for the journey. Judy Mason has gone to great lengths to locate the ideal spots to photograph wind surfers, the Gorge, wild flowers and views of Mt. Hood and Mt Adams. We will spend Saturday and Sunday first traveling along the Washington side of the river along Highway 14, photographing scenic views of the river, the Gorge, Mt Adams and Mt Hood through fields of Balsam Root and Lupine off of Dalles Mt. Road at Columbia Hills State Park near White Salmon. Crossing over to Oregon we'll travel such routes as the historic Highway 30 and I-84 visiting sites such as Rowena Crest, Memloose Hills and others, seeking iconic views. If there is time left we can take in a water fall or two, or you can break away for you own experience.



This is an overnight trip with plans to stay in either Hood River or in Dalles Oregon. Several have already made reservations at the Best Western in Hood River but there are cheaper places nearby, but you want to make your reservations soon. The best way is to google motels in the area to get a rate you can afford. Trivago is an excellent tool but you may have another favorite. Look for someone to share a room, cutting the cost in half.

We always recommend carpooling and if you plan on staying in Hood River carpooling will work regardless of the hotel you are staying in, but if you stay in The Dalles you will have to seek others who are staying there. Understandably you may be reluctant to leave your car in a shopping center parking lot overnight so if you wish to carpool meet us at the Black Lake Grange, 6011 Black Lake Blvd, Olympia by 9 AM Saturday morning (Apr. 30). Cars can then be left across the street at Dale and Colleen's home. **Directions:** Take Black Lake exit off Hwy 101; head south/west. Grange is 4 miles south on Black Lake Blvd, next to the Fire Station.

A tripod or a monopod is always a good idea and you may want to take a circular polarizer as well as graduated neutral density filters. You might consider extra batteries or a battery charger in your pack. Bring a lunch for Saturday as well as drinks and snacks for the full weekend. We have a restaurant picked out that will attempt to seat us in a separate room for dinner Saturday night.

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## ASK TIM GREY

### Today's Question:

When I open a RAW capture with Photoshop Elements, the Camera Raw dialog appears. How important is it to apply adjustments in Camera Raw first, rather than just opening the image and getting to work in the [Elements] Editor?

### Tim's Answer:

In general I recommend applying at least the basic adjustments for tone and color within Adobe Camera Raw, in order to better take advantage of the benefits available in the original RAW capture data. This is actually especially important when using Photoshop Elements, since you don't have the opportunity to apply as many adjustments in the 16-bit per channel mode.

In order to use adjustment layers and a variety of other tools within the Photoshop Elements Editor, you need to convert the image to the 8-bit per channel mode rather than the 16-bit per channel mode. Working in the 16-bit per channel mode provides a variety of benefits, including the potential for smoother gradations of tone and color within the photo.

Therefore, in the case of Photoshop Elements I recommend applying as many adjustments as possible within Adobe Camera Raw. This is especially important if you'll convert the RAW capture directly to the 8-bit per channel mode. If you convert to 16-bit per channel you have a little more flexibility, but you would still then want to finalize as many adjustments in the Elements Editor before converting to the 8-bit per channel mode, assuming you have any reason at all to convert to 8-bit per channel mode.

So, if you'll be working in the 16-bit per channel mode in the Elements Editor, it isn't as important to apply most of your adjustments in Adobe Camera Raw first. But if you'll convert to the 8-bit per channel mode, I highly recommend making full use of Adobe Camera Raw before processing the image and opening the resulting image within the Elements Editor.

### Today's Question:

Do you think Google's announcement that the Nik Collection is now free means the end of the Nik Collection?

### Tim's Answer:

Yes. I suspect we will never see another update to the Nik Collection, as noted in the latest episode of Tim Grey TV (<https://youtu.be/2Z0pYDysVDU>).

When Google originally acquired Nik Software, there was speculation that Google was really only interested in the Snapseed app for mobile devices. Rumors swirled that staff from Nik Software had been let go, and everything I heard suggested there would not be any updates to the Nik Collection.

I was a bit surprised when shortly after the acquisition there was an update to Analog Efex Pro, but I suspect that was just a matter of delivering an update that had already been nearly complete before the acquisition.

In the announcement posted on Google+ (<https://plus.google.com/+NikCollection/posts/AFGsG2Di7EK>)

part of the explanation indicates that, "As we continue to focus our long-term investments in building incredible photo editing tools for mobile, including Google Photos and Snapseed, we've decided to make the Nik Collection desktop suite available for free...." Perhaps that means that means the Nik Collection will be updated and still be offered for free, similar to other apps that are available. But I interpret this statement as an indication that this is the end of the line for the Nik Collection.

I've been a big fan of many of the tools in the Nik Collection, and continue to use several of those tools in my workflow. I would love to see future updates to make these tools even better than they already are, but I suspect that won't be the case.
