Working with Artistic Programs

To combine the effects of an artistic program like Topaz with the original photo I find many times I get the desired effect by using layers. The following is one process I use.

Using ON1 (or another program) as a starting point, I do the basic edits for tone and color. Without cropping, Topaz or another program's plug in is used for the artistic effects. After completing that, I go back into ON1 where I take the Topaz photo and the original photo and layer them putting the artistic version as the top layer. After deciding what areas of the artistic image I want more realistic and to what degree, I paint out those areas with a mask using varying opacities to get the desired effect. Once finished layers are combined via merge or stamp layer, then that image is cropped to the desired size to give me the final image.


Voting on the Northwest Council of Camera Clubs (NWCCC) Traveling Digital Competition is underway. We ask that each of our members select their five favorite images based on standards of Technical, Composition, and Impact Excellence in Photography. In July we are judging the work of the Puget Sound Camera Club. They submitted 25 images and each image is numbered. You should have received an email inviting you to this month's voting and giving you the links necessary to view and vote.

Processing Milky Way Images

I thought this would be an appropriate article subject in light of our first official OCC field trip to Sunrise Park at Mt. Rainier on July 10 for Milky Way photography. I am writing this several days before the trip, but I am sure we will have a great time.

You can use any editing program. These days I am mostly using Capture One as it does a phenomenal job with raw Sony images. I am also using On1 and Topaz AI Denoise. I am going to discuss editing single images. I also use Sequator for processing stacked images and then apply most of the steps below.

Step 1: My first step is usually to straighten the horizon and crop if necessary.

Step 2: I am somewhat undecided about the next step. Sometimes I do noise reduction next and sometimes I do noise reduction as the last step before exporting to a jpeg. It kind of depends on how noisy the original image is. My current camera, the Sony A9, does an incredible job with noise at higher ISOs. Therefore, I tend to do the noise reduction at the end. If I do use Topaz AI Denoise as step 2, I save the image as a TIFF before bringing it back into Capture One or On1.

Step 3: White balance adjustment. I tend to make the image somewhat cooler (more blue) and even use the tungsten preset as a starting point for white balance. I have also used a blue graduated filter to reduce light pollution. I am looking forward to seeing whether my new light pollution filter makes a difference in yellow cast that light pollution introduces to my RAW files.

Step 4: My next step is to increase the highlights so that the stars are brighter without increasing the brightness of the dark areas. You also might want to increase the shadows a bit. I then add a little contrast to accentuate the light and dark areas. I tend not to increase the whites and decrease the blacks because the stars can become grayish.

Step 5: Now it becomes a matter of preference. Usually, I mask the MW and make it a little brighter. Next I remove any artifacts like airplanes. I usually leave shooting star trails in. I also check the edges for any chroma aberrations and vignetting. You can also try Dehaze. Dehaze will remove any smoke from the sky which is a real concern these days. I also might add a little clarity and structure.

Step 6: Noise reduction. Usually, I use Topaz AI Denoise.

National Geographic Student Photography Workshop

Camera Club Member Tristan Sterling (age 16), recently attended a 9-day National Geographic student photography workshop at Yellowstone National Park. (The workshop was postponed from 2020 due to COVID). Twenty-one high school students from around the country attended along with three photography leaders and Drew Rush, the National Geo-



graphic photography expert. I interviewed Tristan about his experience:

How did you find out about the workshop?

In 2019, I attended a presentation at the Washington Center for the Performing Arts by National Geographic photographer Ronan Donovan. My brother and I met him after the show. When I mentioned I enjoyed wildlife photography, he told me about the workshop.

What equipment did you use?

I used a Nikon D5600, a Tamron 200-600mm lens, a Nikon 105mm macro lens, and a Pro Optic 18-200mm lens. I brought a travel tripod but only used it once. I prefer hand held. I was one of only a few participants who took macro photos during the workshop. My mom joked that I went all the way to Yellowstone to get a picture of a mosquito and an ant.

What did you enjoy most?

I really liked interacting with the other photographers.

What are the most important things you learned?

I learned the importance of shooting in RAW. I also learned and became comfortable using manual mode. Drew Rush told us not to worry if we go on a photo shoot and don't get any good photos.

What program did you use to edit your photos?

Lightroom Classic.

Where did you stay?

We stayed the first two nights at Montana State University in Bozeman. Then we spent four nights just outside the North entrance to Yellowstone in Gardiner, MT. We returned to Bozeman for the last two nights to edit our photos and select our 12 favorites for a gallery show/video.

What did a typical day look like?

We got up at 4am each day to avoid crowds, look for animals, and get good morning light. We took a break midday for editing photos and free time, and then returned to the park in the evenings for more photos. We were also able to spend some time at the Bozeman hot springs pools.

What area of the park did you enjoy the most?

My favorite area was Bear Tooth highway which was actually just outside the northeast entrance of the park. It had amazing views. There were also mountain goats, pikas, and marmots there. I also liked the Old Faithful area.

What was the most common animal you saw?

Definitely bison. There were several large herds in Lamar Valley and Hayden Valley.

What was your favorite thing to photograph?

The Mountain Bluebird

Do you recommend Yellowstone for photographers?

Yes, because there are many photo opportunities of wildlife, landscape, and geothermal features.




