1. All images must be JPEGs – no RAW or TIFF images.

 3. Scavenger Hunt Images. Name your images as Sxx_Name_word.jpg where
 - a. S means scavenger hunt, xx is the number of the word and word is the category. For example, an image submitted for the fifth word Movement would be named S05_RosalindPhilips_Movement.jpg.
 - b. Please include a list of your images with descriptions.
 - c. Favorite/Best of 2021-22 images. Name your images as Bxx_Name_ImageName.jpg .
 - d. B means Favorite/Best of 2021-22, xx is the number of the image, Name is your name and ImageName is the name of the image. For example the eighth image I submit would be named, B08_RosalindPhilips_BergyBit.jpg.
 - e. Please include a self Identification Image as your eleventh image.
 - f. Please put your images in a folder with your name on it. Put the folder in Annual Meeting Images folder inside the OCC Member Sharing folder on Dropbox. I clear out the folder daily, so do not worry if you do not see your images in the folder.

Hector D. Astorga – What Makes an Award-Winning Image: How to Approach Nature Photography Competition

Hector D. Astorga is a full-time wildlife photographer based in South Texas. His love of nature and the outdoors began as a child in his native country, Honduras. He is the ranch manager at the Santa Clara Ranch, a photography ranch that hosts wildlife photographers from all over the globe. He leads and conducts photography tours and workshops at multiple locations in North, Central, and South America, Scandinavia, and Africa.



In 2019 his image of a Three-toed Sloth w/ baby won the prestigious Nature's Best Windland Smith Rice International Awards Wildlife Category. With over 25,000 entries from photographers in sixty-three different countries the Nature's Best competition is one of the premier nature photography competitions in the world.



He is a six-time Grand Prize winner of the Wildlife in Focus and Valley Land Fund Photography competitions. From 2008 thru 2017 he won first Grand Prize four times, second Grand Prize once and also has a third Grand Prize finish. He won top honors in the 2009 National Wildlife Federation Photography Contest and in the 2012 Rocky Mountain Outdoor Writers and Photographers Photography competition.

In 2016, one of his images was selected as a "Best of Show" by the North American Nature Photography Association (NANPA) in their Annual Showcase competition. His images have been in the Top NANPA Showcase awards for the last six years in a row.

His work is featured in Nature's Best Magazine, Audubon Magazine, National Wildlife Federation Magazine, Texas Parks and Wildlife Magazine, National Geographic Guide Books, Ranger Rick Magazine, The Chicago Tribune, Quail Unlimited, and other national and regional publications.

Hector is one of the "We Will Not Be Tamed" Ambassadors for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Foundation. The ambassadors are a group of remarkable Texan outdoorsmen and women who stand together and tell stories about Texas, the place that has given them so much. He uses his work for land and wildlife conservation in his home state.

The Rest of the Story

Whenever I take a long drive to a different town or state, I try to take a new route or at least stop in a new town. It's a great way to find new places to photograph. Sometimes it's worth the effort and sometimes it's not, but I always try when time is not an issue. Recently I was driving I-90 and decided to pull off at the junction with State Route 23 to see what was in the town of Sprague, WA.

Sprague is a small town in Lincoln County with a population of about 400 people. At first, I was a little disappointed with the photographic opportunities. The downtown has some interesting old buildings that could be worth photographing and there are few power lines to interrupt the image. There is a Railroad Museum, but it is closed until they can find some volunteers. Sitting prominently at the top of a hill is a wonderful church that was built in 1902.

But beyond that it seemed there was little to make my stop worth the stop. But then I saw an entire lot of old trucks. I wandered around the outer edges of the area and took photos.

When I came around to the front section, I found a sign that let me know all about the lot full of old trucks and that I was welcome to take pictures. So, I happily spent a good hour walking through and finding some wonderful images. This is a must stop to photograph if you have the time.

The collection of old trucks has been put together by Dave Jones starting more than twenty years ago. The first trucks he collected had to be drivable or towable as he had no other way to move them. Then about fifteen years ago he finally had a way to bring the trucks back to Sprague on a flatbed truck.

When he first started putting the old trucks in the lot some of the neighbors complained but as the accumulation grew the neighbors got over it. Dave's collection is now at about sixty trucks. There is also some old farm

equipment. The trucks have become an attraction that brings people off I-90 to stop and take pictures. The lot is unfenced, and you are welcome to look around and take photos. As you walk around the lot you will find other photographic opportunities and more vehicles parked nearby. I know I will make another stop the next time I am driving across the state.

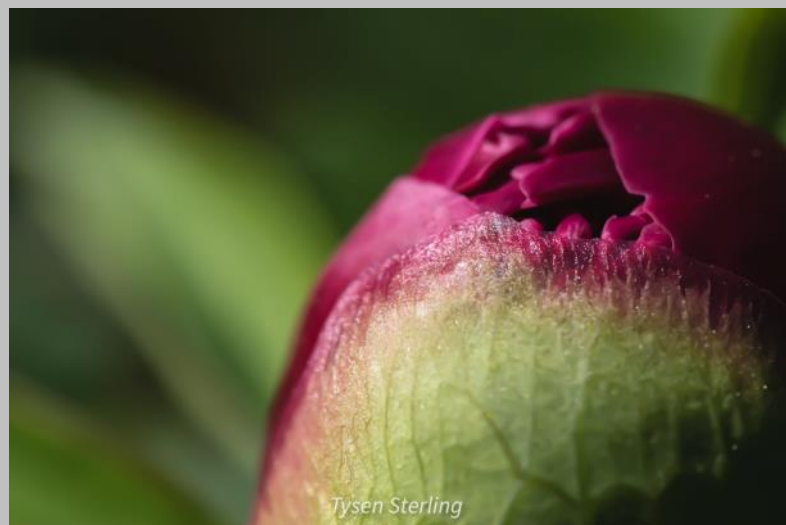

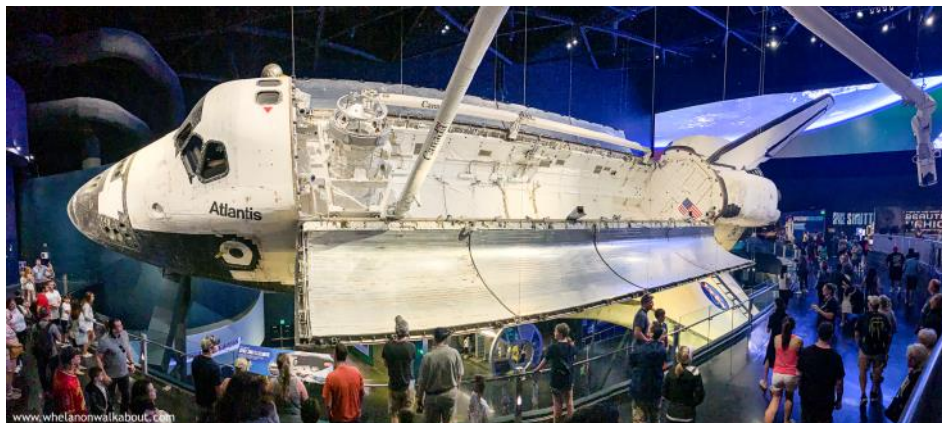
Zoom vs in person meetings.

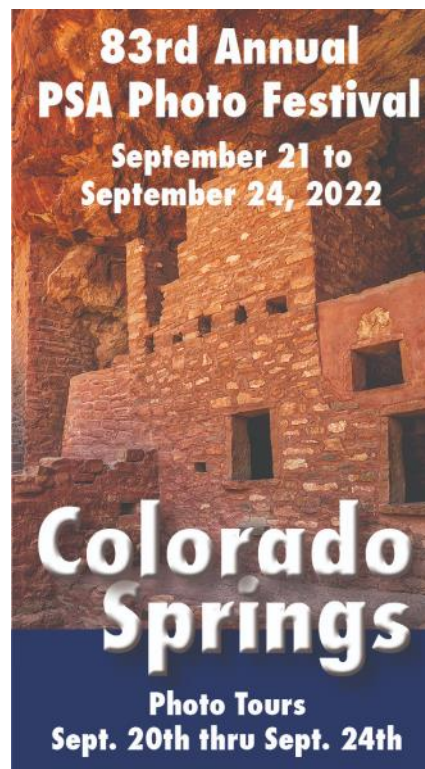
