August Field Trip Mt St Helen's Photographing the Night Sky August 27, 2022

As a follow up to our August Practical Photography meeting we will be taking a field trip to Mt St Helen's to photograph blue hour, golden hour and the night sky. We will meet up at Loowit Point which is the last view point before you reach the Johnston Ridge Visitor Center. You can arrive whenever you want.

Golden hour is from
7:22 to 8pm
Blue hour is from 8:23
to 8:36pm
Sunset is at 8pm



It will not be dark enough to really photograph the Milky Way until around 10pm.

You can go as early as you want and stay as long as you wish.

This field trip will be weather dependent as we will need clear skies to photograph the stars and Milky Way. I will be watching the weather conditions and several apps that give information on the night sky visibility.

If you have never photographed the night sky this field trip is for you. There will be plenty of seasoned club members present to help you get set up and answer questions.

Equipment to bring

Camera with wide angle lens, macro lens for wild flowers and telephoto lens for landscapes

Tripod is a must for night photography

Flashlight or headlamp preferably with a red lens

Warm clothing to dress in layers as it gets cold and sometimes windy (hat and gloves)

Bag lunch, snacks and drinks as there is nowhere on the mountain to get food

A lawn chair or camp stool so you can rest while waiting for the sky to get dark enough

There are bathrooms at Coldwater Lake which is about five miles before Loowit Point.

Because this field trip is very weather dependent, we may have to cancel it at the last minute. If the trip has to be canceled a notification will be put on the OCC Facebook page and on the club calendar.

So, please join us at Loowit Point for a fun night of photography and a time to meet and greet and just have a great time.

Traveling Images

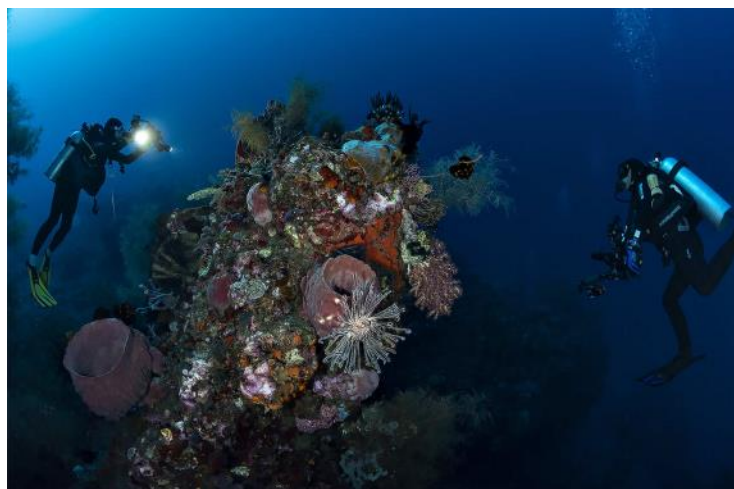

The Rest of The Story

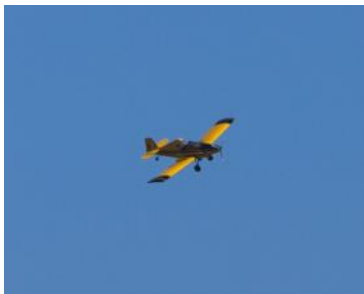

The Palouse Flyer is a composite image of four aircraft shots and one background layer.

The crop duster was captured in burst mode with a Lumix G9 camera and 100-400 lens. Camera settings were 1/2500 shutter, F7.1, and ISO 400. The landscape settings, using the same gear, were 1/800 shutter, F9, and ISO 400.



As the crop duster worked a field, I positioned myself to be at the end of a spraying run. Using slow burst mode, I capture images starting with the plane turning on approach to when it was about to spray. From the group of aircraft shots, four were selected for the composite to give a feel for what the plane was doing.



On1 software was used first for basic tone and color, noise reduction, and dynamic contrast adjustments. Each plane image was then masked and turned into a transparency. The background landscape image was taken over to Studio II where filters were used to give it a watercolor effect as opposed to just adding blur. The image was then sent back to ON1 to be the background layer of the composite. The four crop duster transparencies were then layered on top and adjusted for plane size and placement to create the composite image. Then Silver Efex Pro did the conversion to black and white.



Remember Film Cameras?

Is it time for you to move on? I have a place where you can consider going forward or looking back.

My favorite podcaster, Derrick Story of The Digital Story podcast, runs an Esty site where you can purchase an inexpensive film camera or you can donate your old film camera. Most items are under \$100, and all cameras have been checked out.

If you want to find a new home for your old film camera, he can clean it up and put it out for another fine photographer to find and love. He will send you instructions and a shipping label to make it safe and easy.

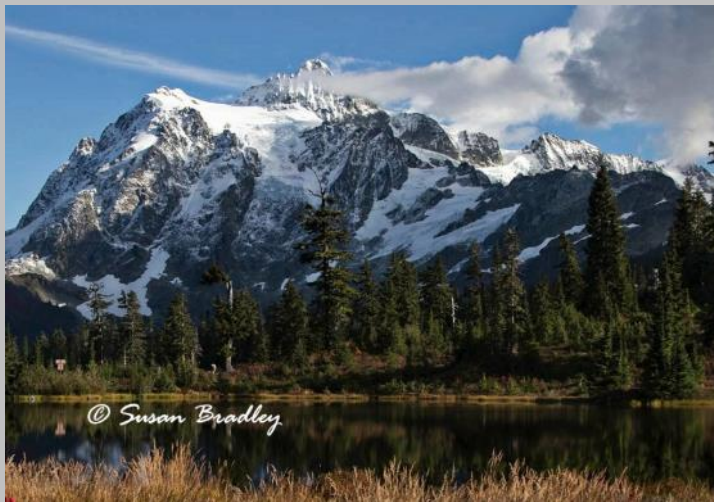

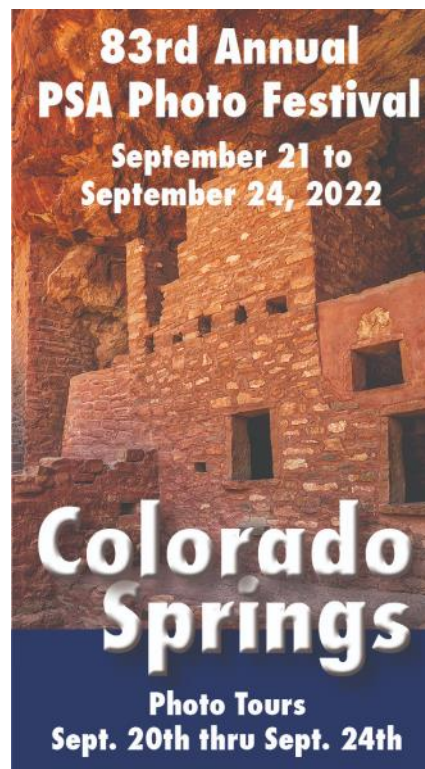
