Some time ago my very old 13-inch HP photo printer printed its last photo and died. At the time I thought it didn't make much sense to spend \$1,000 to replace it. I knew I could order a lot of prints for that amount of money and besides printers take up a lot of room.

This is all perfectly rational but leaves out one thing. I love to print my photos.

I put together my first darkroom almost 50 years ago when printing your images was the final step in the process. You either had a darkroom or access to one to control the look of your image. To share an image, you had to hold a print in your hand for a friend to view.

Times have changed, today the very idea of needing a room full of equipment and chemicals to create and control an image and sharing by taking the image across town to show someone seems very strange.

One of the things that for me, has not changed, is printing being a needed final step in the photographic process. Of course, like everyone else, I share my images online and with the club but never really feel they are done until I have printed them.

Needless to say, I lasted only a year without a photo printer. I now print the best of what I capture to feel like the process is complete and I have done justice to the image. If this seems a little abstract you are right. I cannot rationally justify the time and expense involved in printing my own photos but I can say the same thing about photography in general.

We all love photography and the process is different for us all. For me it is looking at a finished print and knowing I have done all I can.

It's getting closer to the Thurston County Fair which is later this month. Our club is the sponsor of the Open Class Photography Exhibit and it's our club volunteers that will make it successful. Club members will be taking in prints on Saturday, July 22, assisting with judging on

Sunday, July 23, and hanging the prints on Monday, July 24. Thanks to **all** of you who have volunteered to help with this event.

Club members will also staff the information desk on Wednesday, July 26 through Sunday, July 30 from 10 am

to 10 pm each day. We've set up a schedule that puts two people on 3-hour shifts throughout the day. Those volunteering for these shifts will receive free admission to the fair and can come early or stay after their shift to enjoy the fair.



For those who are working the pre-fair weekend as well as

manning the information desk, we will have your admission tickets to hand out at that time. For the rest of the volunteers we will mail your tickets to you the week before the fair starts.

It is called Abstract Images and is defined as images with no readily defined subject: patterns, textures, intentional camera movement, etc. We're hoping to have some really good participation in this lot to kick it off, so if you have something you think fits, please consider entering it. For those wondering what the heck an abstract is NaturePhotographers.network has an <u>Abstract</u> Category that you might want to scan though. It is limited to nature images.

MOUNTING DISCOUNTS

Both Beard's Framing in Lacey and Olympia Framemakers on Harrison in West Olympia have offered to give discounts on mounting. Additionally, you can have them submit the prints for the fair, but you will have to put the required information on the back of the print after it's mounted and provide them with your entry form.

Shooting and Processing Fireworks A Workflow

I hope many of you got out and shot some fireworks this week on July 4 and if you didn't, Lakefair is right around the corner. The fireworks show starts at 10 pm on July 16. Get to your location early so you can get a good spot and find parking (https://www.lakefair.org/events).

You can shoot fireworks with any camera, even your



phone. The secret is to use a tripod to keep the camera steady as you will be doing long exposures. I will be focusing on using a mirrorless camera or DSLR. Besides a tripod, you will need a remote release, a wide-angle

lens, a telephoto lens or a zoom lens with a wide range and a chair or stool for waiting. There are several options for a remote release. You can buy a remote release; I use a wired one because it works better in the dark and you don't need to contort your body to point the remote at the sensor. You can get an app on your phone, or you can just use the timer function on your camera (use the 2s timer). Pressing the shutter introduces camera shake and your pictures will not be sharp. I like to use my 24-70 mm lens because it allows me to shoot at a wide angle and then



also closer without having to change lenses. Something like Tamron's 18-300 mm will also work well. I also like to use a zoom lens because I can get some cool effects by zooming the lens in and out over the long exposure.

My favorite method is:

- 1. Set the picture type to RAW. This will give you the most flexibility in post-processing.
- 2. Set my aperture to f/11 so that everything will be in sharp focus.
- 3. Set my shutter speed to 5s. I use 5s because any longer and the image tends to be over exposed. I like to capture multiple bursts and light trails.
- 4. Set my ISO to 100.
- 5. Focus on something far away before it gets dark and then switch to manual focus.
- 6. I take a test shot when the fireworks start and check the focus on the LCD screen. I make any adjustments using manual focus as autofocus is not accurate in the dark. I also check whether there is enough light. If the colors are not bright, then I lower the aperture to f/8.

- 7. I take another test just to confirm that everything is to my liking.
- 8. I then keep my gaze on the show and press the remote release when I like what I see.
- 9. Experiment with different focal lengths. Just remember to check that your focus is still sharp.
- 10. Although you can play with white balance in postprocessing, try using incandescent for a couple of your shots. It makes the colors really pop.
- 11. Remember to take both vertical and horizontal images. I prefer vertical when I use longer focal lengths.
- 12. Change your composition so that there is more than fireworks in your frame. The rapt look of an observer looking up at the sky with the fireworks in the background tells a compelling story. Add buildings or the city skyline.
- 13. Another technique to try is to set your camera to multiple exposure where it takes a picture over the current frame. You could also accomplish this by layering several photos in post-processing.



Another method is to set your camera to bulb and then hold the shutter open with your remote for as long as you like.

Here are some post-processing tips using Lightroom, but you can do the same things using any RAW editor such as On1, CaptureOne, or Luminar. The tools mostly have similar names. It also would be fun to process the image in Topaz, after doing the basic adjustments, for special effects.

- 1. First, I go through all my images and pick the ones that look promising. My criteria are focus and symmetry. I generally try to pick a few that are landscape, a few that are portrait, and a few with an interesting foreground. I don't worry too much about composition because I can refine the composition with cropping.
- 2. Next, I decide if I want to do any cropping. I also make sure that horizontal elements are level and that vertical elements are perpendicular to the horizon.
- 3. Now I am ready to start processing by bringing the blacks down so that the blacks are truly black. I also bring down the highlights and maybe the whites a little bit to decrease any hot spots.
- 4. All the adjustments so far have been global adjustments. Now it is time for local or targeted adjustments.

5. I make a medium-sized soft brush.



- a) I bring up the contrast a bit; add some clarity and some vibrance.
- b) I turn off the mask so that I can see the results immediately when I start brushing.
- c) I then brush over the fireworks area to make the adjustments.
- d) I evaluate the results and may make changes to the contrast, clarity and vibrance.
- e) Sometimes I make more brushes and use the Hue/ Saturation/Luminance (HSL) Slider to enhance the reds, blues, greens and purples.
- f) Sometimes I make a brush to experiment how changing the white balance of the fireworks changes the mood of the image.
- g) I usually use the Dehaze tool to lessen the smoke in the image.
- h) I make more brushes to target other areas in the image such as the foreground and background using steps a-g above.

Don't forget to try out B&W on some of your images. It can be magical.

Have fun with the fireworks at Lakefair.

Back to the Future Photographs on Paper

With the recent developments in Artificial Intelligence (AI), some photographers are evaluating what they like about photography and why they like to take photographs. Some photographers are now thinking about and talking about some old-school favorites, film, prints, magazines, film cameras, and some of the things that were my first photo loves.

And some of those photo first loves are still popular topics within the Olympia Camera Club. Last month we had a rousing conversation about prints and printers, and coming up this month is the Thurston County Fair causing many OCC photographers to be going through their work, selecting images for printing and making a final finished print to be judged at the fair.

I too, have developed a renewed interest in prints, photographic paper, and fine art photography. One of my new finds of old processes, is a Photo Zine by John Pemberton, Managing Editor for F2.8 Press, a fellow photographer/writer. His publication is called Archive. I find he is

doing some very contemporary things with his Zine and writes this about the next issue of Archive:

"Our fourth issue of Archive, "They, too, are America" by Lisa Pavlova is available for presale. Deliveries will ship beginning July 25. They, too, are America is a story of opening your soul in a time of mandatory mask wearing, and coming together to fight injustice in an age of social distancing."

I find this topic very contemporary, as well as the photographer. Lisa Pavlova, the photographer of They, too, are America is a Russian national, now living in America.

"Captured on the streets of New York, the project contains portraits of over a hundred protesters at 13 different events during summer and fall of 2020. Originally from Russia, Lisa Pavlova left home in 2018, tired of an unjust system and an inability to create change. These events were her first encounters with the civil rights movement in the US. The project started as a tool to show people in her home country that BLM protesters are not a marginalized group of looters as Russian state media typically shows. Quickly it became an ode to the bravery and inspiration behind the BLM movement." *June 2023*

Magazines, zines and photographic prints are very much still alive and living in 2023. Maybe you would like to step away from electronics and enjoy a quiet piece of photographic paper.

Antelope Canyon Amazing Photo Opportunities

Antelope Canyon Tours, in Page AZ, is operated by the Navajo Nation and is a tour of Upper Antelope Slot Canyon. During a recent sharing night, I showed a photo from this tour that generated some questions and interest. As a result, I felt a short article on Antelope Canyon would be of interest to the club.

Located a short distance from Page, is the tour's staring point. You will

need reservations. From there, you will be transported to the canyon in 4WD tour trucks; the ride to Antelope Can-

yon is 20 minutes and is a little bumpy as you sit in the open rear of the vehicles. Once you arrive, you will be guided through the iconic sandstone walls, shaped by years and years of water and wind. What makes the canyon so amazing is how the light from above filters in and hits the sandstone walls and ceiling. As the sun moves the light and colors change. The tour guide will show you places




through the canyon to take memorable photos, tell you some history of the canyon, and some local history.

The walk through the canyon is a good 1/4 mile, once you have reached the end of the canyon you will then proceed to hike around the canyon – the hike involves some soft sand, stairs, and ramps, so it is best to wear closed-toe shoes. With the hike, the walk is 3/4's of a mile. When we took the tour a couple of years ago you went through the canyon



both ways, giving more time to photograph, but it was very crowded because of groups going both ways. The new itinerary should be better for taking photos. This is one of the best places I've been to take photos, but all images taken will be handheld as no tripods are allowed. The lighting is dim in the canyon. Plan for high ISO.




